Earl of Hillsborough sent to the Board two letter from the governor of North Carolina, and a petition to the king from the Council praying for an allowance out of the quitrents similar to that allowed the Council of Virginia. A draught of a representation to the king ordered to be prepared.
26.	1768, 24 October. Letter from Tryon dated April 25, 1768, transmitting a memorial of the Council to the king in Council praying that an allowance may be made to them as is made for like services in Virginia. Also, the address of the North Carolina Council to the governor enclosed.
27.	1768, 24 October. Letter from Tryon tleted June 16, 1768, relating some disturbances occurring in Orange and Anson counties. Also, enclosed the address of the colony for a paper currency.
