Abstract:	The Black Mountain College Project (BMC Project) was incorporated as a not- for-profit corporation in the State of New York in 1999 by Mary Emma Harris, Black Mountain College scholar and author of <i>The Arts at Black Mountain</i> <i>College</i> (The MIT Press, 1987). The mission of the project is the preservation and interpretation of the history and influence of Black Mountain College through preservation of primary documents, interviews with former faculty and students, and dissemination of information via multiple platforms including presentations, articles, and online resources. The donation of the BMC Project Collection to the Western Regional Archives represents a major step in the accomplishment of its goals.
	The BMC Project papers are extensive and varied. The hundreds of photographs and negatives by Felix Krowinski provide candid photographs of classes, student life, the work program and other activities during the post-war years. The negatives and snapshots of Masato Nakagawa in the summer of 1949 document the dome created by Buckminster Fuller that summer at the college. Other photographs record summer sessions and general college life. There are a large number of college publications including drama and concert programs as well as bulletins and flyers. The collection includes graduation theses in music by James Boardman Jamieson and John Stix, both written under the supervision of conductor Heinrich Jalowetz. Letters to family and friends from Margaret Williamson Peterson, Elaine Schmitt Urbain, Ati Gropius Johansen and Marcia Chamberlain, among others, capture daily life at the college and reveal the youthful concerns of the students. Documents and memorandums record college philosophy and ideals as well as conflicts and operational concerns.

The BMC Project has identified to the best of its ability events and individuals in photographs as well as documents.

The BMC Project Collection enhance the already extensive collections of Black Mountain College documents at the Western Regional Archives. These collections are a rich resource for scholars, educators and artists internationally who are interested the history, the accomplishments, and the educational ideas of Black Mountain College.

- **Biography or History:** Black Mountain College was founded in the fall of 1933 by a group of dissident faculty, among them John Andrew Rice and Theodore Dreier, from Rollins College. The school closed in 1957. Central to the college's philosophy was a democratic organization of the college which was owned and operated by the faculty; the role of experience in education; a holistic education - head, heart, and hand – through intellectual studies, community life, the arts and the crafts, and work on the college farm and campus maintenance. The arts were placed at the center of the curriculum. The college attracted those interested in an alternative educational experience and an arts-centered curriculum. A number of notable European refugees were hired to teach, among them Josef Albers, Anni Albers, and Xanti Schawinsky from the Bauhaus; in music, Heinrich Jalowetz and Stefan Wolpe; and in the sciences and math, Max Wilhelm Dehn and Natasha Goldowski, among others. The college became a magnet for young American students and teachers, including, Ruth Asawa, John Chamberlain, Howard Dearstyne, Mary Gregory, Lou Harrison, Ray Johnson, Karen Karnes, Kenneth Noland, Charles Olson, Robert Rauschenberg, M.C. Richards, Dorothea Rockburne, Kenneth Snelson and David Weinrib. Among the faculty for the special summer sessions in the arts were John Cage, Clement Greenberg, José de Creeft, Merce Cunningham, Lyonel Feininger, Walter Gropius, Franz Kline, and Jack Tworkov. The college's influence has been pervasive in the fields of education, the arts, literature, as well as math and science.

BOX 1 Andrews-Asawa

Andrews, Richard Lloyd (January 3, 1918 – December 6, 1997)

Richard "Dick" Lloyd Andrews was an artist and educator who attended Black Mountain College from 1936 to 1940. At Black Mountain, Andrews took courses in the liberal arts with an emphasis on literature and the visual arts. He took Josef Albers's courses in color and design and studied weaving with Anni Albers. In 1938-39 he taught art at the Black Mountain public school, grades one through six. He graduated with Marcel Breuer as his examiner. During World War II, Andrews served as an Air Force photo reconnaissance specialist in Africa and Southern France. After the war, he studied for two years at the Art Students League in New York City. Andrews taught art at the New Canaan School in New Canaan, Connecticut; the Scarborough School in Scarborough, New York; St. Basil's Academy; and at the Harvey School until his retirement. Andrews had a lifelong fascination with narrow gauge railroads and was a columnist for the *Narrow Gauge Gazette* for twenty years. He also designed ice boats and sailboats. Sketchbooks from the Black Mountain years by Andrews are in the collection of the Asheville Art Museum.

Asawa, Ruth Aiko (January 24, 1926- August 6, 2013)

Ruth Aiko Asawa was born in a small farming community in California to Japanese immigrant parents on January 24, 1926. She began drawing as a child and continued with her passion for art and creative endeavors throughout her life. In 1942, the Asawa family was forced away from their home and into an internment camp in Rowher, Arkansas. There Asawa spent her free time drawing and painting with the professional artists who were also interred. Upon graduation from high school, she was given a scholarship to the Milwaukee State Teachers College in Wisconsin, but she was unable to fulfill her student teacher requirement and graduate because of hostility towards Japanese people immediately following World War II. While at the Milwaukee College, Asawa met members of the Schmitt family (Elaine, Elizabeth, Conrad, and Rupert), and Elaine Schmitt (Urbain) and Asawa became great friends. Elaine was already at Black Mountain College when Asawa decided to join her and study art. She

enrolled first for the 1946 Summer Art Institute and remained through the spring of 1949, except for the summer of 1947 when she was in Mexico and the first part of the 1949 fall semester when she was in California assisting her parents. At Black Mountain Asawa met Albert Lanier and the couple would marry in 1949. They chose to settle in San Francisco because it had a vibrant art scene and was more welcoming to interracial couples. They were parents to six children, two of whom were adopted. While caring for her family, Asawa continued to paint, draw, and experiment with her now acclaimed crocheted-wire sculptures. She was commissioned to create a number of public sculptures including the Mermaid Fountain in Ghirardelli Square; the San Francisco Fountain at the Grand Hyatt; and the Japanese-American Internment Sculpture in San Jose. She was an activist for arts in education and cofounder of the Alvarado School Arts Workshop. The Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts honors her contribution to arts education in the city.

Lanier, William Albert (April 12, 1927- October 31, 2008)

Albert Lanier was born in a small town in Georgia. At the age of sixteen he enrolled at Georgia Tech to study architecture. He interrupted his studies to serve in the United States Navy. After service he returned to Georgia Tech, but decided along with other dissatisfied students including Ragland Watkins and Si Sillman to enroll at Black Mountain to study art and architecture. Lanier enrolled in the fall of 1947 and remained through the summer of 1948. He was instrumental in the design and construction of the Minimum House at the college. At Black Mountain, Lanier met his wife, Ruth Asawa, and the couple married in 1949 making San Francisco their home. Initially, Lanier worked as an architectural draftsman and took on various architectural jobs to help support the family. He worked for a year for San Francisco architect Mario Corbett before establishing a partnership with Roy Maru. After working for John Funk, he established a second partnership with Paul Merrill. Lanier was noted for his residential designs and renovations. A committed preservationist, he was instrumental in saving the historic Piazzoni murals at the de Young Museum from destruction and designed the first renovation of the Noe Valley Branch Library. He designed a number of youth hostels in California. He worked tirelessly with Ruth to establish a high school for the arts, the Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts. Asawa and Lanier were collaborators on many projects, and their home in the Mission district was a center for arts and political activism.

Ballon, Joy

(October 18, 1928- January 5, 2008)

Joy Ballon Meyer was a student at Black Mountain College in the summer of 1949. A member of the Anglophone (English speaking) community in Montreal, Quebec, Ballon was an art student at McGill University. Her teacher Arthur Lismer, a member of the "Group of Seven" which were seeking to define a distinctive voice in art for Canada, recommended Black Mountain College to her. A year later she enrolled at the Institute of Design in Chicago. She decided to pursue an academic career in family life and sex education. After receiving her degree from McGill, she taught at the Jewish Family Services in Montreal and in the English-speaking curriculum of the College Marie-Victorin.

Barton, Ruth (May 28, 1915-March 7, 2005)

Ruth "Peggy" Barton French was a student at Black Mountain College from 1935 to 1938. She grew up in Chestnut Hill outside Boston where she attended the progressive Beaver Country Day School and later Bennington College. At Black Mountain she took a general curriculum and music, playing the flute in the college orchestra. She married Nathaniel "Nat" S. French (April 21, 1912-May 14, 1983), also a Black Mountain College student. In Winnetka, Illinois, where French was a teacher and headmaster at the North Shore Country Day School, she was homemaker for her family including their two children and two nephews. She also worked for a number of summers at the French family's Alamoosook Island Camp in Maine. After her divorce, she lived in Dublin, New Hampshire where she was active in local music activities.

Bentley, Eric Russell (September 14, 1916-)

Eric Russell Bentley is an American critic, playwright, singer, editor and translator. Bentley was born September 14, 1916 in Bolton, Lancashire, England and attended Oxford University, receiving his degree in 1938. He subsequently attended Yale University (B.Litt., 1939 and Ph.D., 1941). Bentley taught history and drama at Black Mountain College for the 1942 summer session. He returned in the winter of 1943 as a member of the faculty and remained through the summer of 1944. At Black Mountain he wrote *The Century of Hero Worship* (1944). He took a leave of absence in the summer of 1944 to teach at Fiske University. He resigned from Black Mountain College at the end of the summer as a result of a conflict at the college. When he left Black Mountain, Bentley taught at the University of Minnesota. Beginning in 1953, he taught at Columbia University and simultaneously was a theater critic for *The New Republic*. From 1960-1961, Bentley was the Norton Professor at Harvard University. Bentley is an authority on Bertholt Brecht, whom he met at UCLA as a young man and whose works he has translated extensively. He edited the Grove Press issue of Brecht's work. Bentley became an American citizen in 1948, and currently lives in New York City. Bentley was married to Maja Tschernjakow Bentley Apelman, a student at Black Mountain College. They were later divorced. In 1953 he married Joanne Davis. They had twin sons.

Bentley, Maja (September 3, 1922-Janury 5, 2004)

Maja Tschernjakow Bentley (Apelman) was born in Vienna in 1922 and moved with her family in 1938 to London as a refugee from National Socialism. She attended the Summerhill School in northern England before moving with her family to New York City (Queens) in 1940. She was student at Black Mountain College for the summer of 1942. She returned for the winter and spring quarters in 1943 and remained through the 1944 summer session. She married Eric Bentley, a history and drama teacher at Black Mountain. She later completed her B.A. degree at Barnard College. She was translator with Bentley for Parables for the Theatre and Two Plays by Bertolt Brecht: The Good Woman of Setzuan and The Causasian Chalk Circle (1948). She obtained her M.A. in education at the University of Minnesota while Bentley was teaching there. After her divorce from Bentley, she obtained a second M.A. degree from Bank School College of Education. She married Martin Apelman, a pianist and woodworker, among other things. They lived in Manhattan where their son Mark was born. She worked and taught at Headstart, New York University and Bank Street College. In 1971 when she divorced, Maja Apelman and her son moved to Boulder, Colorado where she worked at the Mountain View Center for Environmental Education, a teacher's center founded by MacArthur Fellow David Hawkins and his wife Frances Pockman Hawkins. She authored Block Building: Some Practical Suggestions for Teachers (1982), Critical Barriers Phenomenon in Elementary School with David Hawkins and Philip Morrison (1985), and Exploring Everyday Math with Julia A. King (1993).

Bergmann, Peter Gabriel (March 24, 1915- October 19, 2002)

Bergmann, Margot Eisenhardt (January 18, 1913- January 26, 2001)

Peter Gabriel Bergmann and Margot E. Bergmann were members of the faculty at Black Mountain College for the 1941-1942 academic year, teaching physics and chemistry, respectively. Peter Bergmann earned a Ph.D. from the German University in Prague and then joined Albert Einstein at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, New Jersey in 1936. From 1936 to 1941, he collaborated with Einstein on attempts to construct a unified field theory to explain all the forces of nature. In the spring of 1942, while at Black Mountain, his first textbook on general relativity, *Introduction to the Theory of Relativity* (Prentice-Hall, 1942) with an introduction by Einstein, was published. The book had been written in Princeton. After leaving Black Mountain, Bergmann taught at Lehigh University in Pennsylvania. From 1944 to 1947 he was engaged in war research on underwater sound at Columbia University and the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution. From 1947 until his retirement, Bergman taught at Syracuse University. He then took a post as Research Professor at New York University. In 2003 he was posthumously awarded the Einstein Prize (with Dr. John Wheeler) for outstanding accomplishments in the field of gravitational physics.

Margot Eisenhardt Bergmann was born in Dresden in 1913. In her younger years, she held positions as an apprentice in a bookstore specializing in journals. In 1934 she fled Germany for Prague, Czechoslovakia. There she studied chemistry at the German University. Peter Bergmann, whom she had met previously in Dresden, was there studying physics and the couple married. A grant for Peter from the Rockefeller Foundation made it possible for the Bergmann's to come to the United States. When Peter joined the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, Margot taught at New Jersey College for Women and then at Rutgers University where she was the only woman in the chemistry department. At Black Mountain College she taught chemistry. A physical chemist, Margot Bergmann worked at Polytechnic University in Brooklyn, New York.

The majority of the letters and postcards in the Bergmann collection are personal correspondence between Margot and Peter Bergmann. Many of the letters from Peter were written to Margot in the fall of 1941 when her arrival at the college was delayed until mid-October and in the spring of 1942 when she had surgery in New York. The Bergmann's son Ernest was born on November 2, 1942 and their second son John on November 13, 1949. Letters from Black Mountain discuss the uncertainty of employment after leaving Black Mountain, plans for the summer of 1942, gas rationing, classes, long faculty meetings and conflicts over educational ideals, living accommodations, students, faculty rank, the work program, college food, campus attire, and the publication of *Introduction to the Theory of Relativity.* The correspondence is dated from 1939 to 1947. In a letter to Peter Bergmann's mother of September 24, soon after arriving at Black Mountain, he describes his recommendation to the college by Nathan Rosen, the American educational system, the college's founding and ideals, the landscape, and the library (or lack thereof). The Bergmanns generally open their letters with an affectionate salutation. In some cases those salutations have been included as a means of identifying letters, especially those for which there is no date. Peter addresses Margot as "Mein liebes liebes Kerleyen," "Mein geliebtes Schneckelchen," "Lieber Lieb," "Mein liebes Puckelchen," and "Mein liebes liebes Kerl," among others. Berman, Eleanore (September 2, 1928-August 29, 2004)

Eleanore Berman was born in New York, New York. She was only sixteen when she enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1945 Summer Art Institute where she studied with Josef Albers, Lyonel Feininger, Fannie Hillsmith, Robert Motherwell, and Ossip Zadkine. She studied at the Fernand Léger Atelier in Paris and at the Otis Art Institute in Los Angeles while earning her B.A. degree in literature at UCLA. In New York she studied with Manfred Schwartz, Chiam Gross and Adja Yunkers. Berman's art reflects her love of science and the forms of nature, and she often drew on her garden in Beverly Hills for inspiration. She painted and made prints, usually working in "series" which explored a particular idea or image. Her work was exhibited throughout the United States. She was married twice and worked under the names Eleanore Nicholas and Eleanore Lazarof as well as Eleanore Berman.

Bishop, Mary Alice (May 7, 1933-February 23, 2015)

Mary Alice Bishop was married to Richard "Rich" Bishop (b. June 7, 1928) upon graduation from high school in Elmhurst, Illinois. Immediately thereafter they left for Black Mountain College. She was there intermittently from the summer of 1951 through the summer of 1953. She was a student and then a faculty wife. She studied weaving with Andrew "Andy" Oates. She also studied music and dance. At the end of the first summer, she and Richard returned to Chicago where he had been enrolled at the University of Chicago and she worked as a secretary. They returned to Black Mountain and she took courses and cared for their two children. When the Bishops left the college, they moved with Tommy Jackson to South Royalton, Vermont where they hoped to establish a Black Mountain-like community. The community did not work out. They joined a commune near Jaffrey, Vermont where Mary Bishop was active in the running of an open school Hidden Springs. Richard taught at the high school in Plainfield, Vermont and at other schools. In South Acworth, New Hampshire the Bishops were part of a land trust that housed a number of communes. They built their own house. Mary Bishop was active in the local general store and ran the Turn Around Barn, a combination thrift shop and recycling center. Mary Bishop obtained a loom and continued to study independently and to weave. She was accepted into the League of New Hampshire Craftsmen where she taught and sold her work. She also played the piano and autoharp. After their divorce the Bishops remained in the South Acworth community.

Blaine, Lorna (December 12, 1924 – January 6, 2012)

Born in New York City in 1924, Lorna Blaine Howard Halper studied at Barnard College in New York before enrolling at Black Mountain College for the 1945 Summer Art Institute. She returned to the college in the winter of 1946 as a regular student and remained through the spring of 1948, except for the spring and summer 1947 terms. She studied with Josef Albers, Fannie Hillsmith, Robert Motherwell, Max Dehn and Ilya Bolotowsky, among others. In December 1947, she married Tasker Howard, Jr. (January 15, 1913-February 21, 1952), a former student who was teaching economics. The Howards moved to New York at the end of the 1948 spring semester where Howard worked for the National Labor Relations Board. After Howard's death, Lorna worked for America House, an outlet for crafts. She married novelist and critic Albert Halper. They lived in New York City and then outside Pawling, New York. Hamper's paintings, drawings, and sculptures were exhibited at the Bodley II and Cisneros Galleries in New York and are housed in many private and public collections, including the Asheville Art Museum.

BOX 5 Bliss-Currier folder 5

Bliss, Robert Lewis (May 21, 1921 -)

Robert Bliss studied at Black Mountain College from 1939-42, including the 1941 Summer Work Camp. In addition to the general curriculum, Bliss took design with Josef Albers and courses in architecture with A. Lawrence Kocher and Howard Dearstyne. He also took part in the building program at Lake Eden, specifically the Studies Building, dairy barn, and Service Building. When Bliss left the college, he enrolled at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology for the summer and fall of 1942 before being called to active duty in the army. In 1946, Bliss returned to MIT, studying with Alvar Aalto, Lawrence Anderson and Ralph Rapson, among others. Upon graduation, he worked with the architectural firm of Anderson & Beckwith in Boston. He also taught architecture at MIT, the University of Minnesota, and was chair of the architecture department at the University of Utah. In 1955 he and his wife formed the architectural practice Bliss & Campbell. The firm did primarily residential projects as well as some commercial work. After he retired from the University of Utah, Bliss continued to teach for several years. He has continued his interest in furniture design, designing furniture under the name "Mobilita." At Black Mountain College he designed two chairs, and later at MIT he designed a large conference table and chairs for the office of John Burchard, Dean of Humanities. The chairs were constructed by Mary Gregory, who had taught woodworking at Black Mountain, and had her own shop in Woodstock, Vermont. His furniture is in the permanent collection of Smithsonian-Renwick Gallery in Washington, D.C.

Bodky, Angelica (June 2, 1929- August 18, 2012)

Angelica Bodky Lee, daughter of composer and harpsichordist Erwin Bodky, and Lilli Bodky, was born in 1929 in Berlin, Germany. She immigrated to the Netherlands in 1933 and to the United States in 1938. Angelica was a graduate of The Shady Hill School in Cambridge, The Cambridge School of Weston, and continued her education at the Museum of Fine Arts Museum School. She was a resident at Black Mountain College in 1945 and a student from 1947 to 1949. She married Roger Kenneth Lee on June 10, 1955 in Watertown, Massachusetts and they had two sons. She practiced as a professional sculptor for forty years, creating large works in wood, stone and bronze. She taught clay modeling and carving in the various media at the Cambridge Center for Adult Education and the deCordova Sculpture Park and Museum in Lincoln, Massachusetts. Lee died on August 18, 2012.

Burnside, Katherine Talbott (October 4, 1904-February 1979)

Katherine Talbott Burnside was born in Fort Worth, Texas in 1904. She lived in Parkersburg, West Virginia. In 1944 she travelled to Guadalajara, Mexico to study at the art school there and discovered the school was not yet in operation. On the way back to West Virginia she heard about Jean Charlot and realized that he was teaching at Black Mountain College for the summer. She enrolled for the 1944 Summer Art Institute. She found that she was far more interested in the work of Josef Albers, and his matière studies had a lasting influence on her work. She was an assemblage artist and her work was widely exhibited. She spent summers in Provincetown and was a founder of the "East Coast Group."

Chamberlain, Marcia (April 13, 1926-)

Marcia Russell Chamberlain was born in San Diego, California April 13, 1926 to structural steel engineer Marshall B. Chamberlain and Dorothy Taylor Chamberlain. Chamberlain attended H. Hoover High School from 1941 to 1944 and earned her diploma. From 1944 to 1949 she attended San Diego State College (B.A.). She then enrolled at the University of Southern California from 1944 to 1946 and at San Francisco State College again from 1949 to 1950 without earning another degree. After receiving her B.A. degree she worked in Germany as a member of the Occupation Special Services. She attended Black Mountain College for the 1951 Summer Session. When she left Black Mountain, she obtained her M.F.A. with concentrations in metals and jewelry and in textiles. She worked for the American Crafts Council and other arts institutions in the San José, California area. She was a Professor of Art at San José State University. In 1982 she was instrumental in the organization of the conference of the National Council on Education for the Ceramics Arts, NCECA: San José 82 which focused on California ceramic artists. She founded the Pacific States Craft Fair, a juried fair, as a fund-raiser for the American Craft Council. The fair was continued under the sponsorship of American Craft Enterprises. She co-authored a book *Beyond Weaving* and authored a second book *Metal Jewelry Techniques*.

Corkran, John R. (December 16, 1936-)

John Corkran's father David Corkran, who had been Headmaster at the North Shore Country Day School in Winnetka, Illinois, taught history at Black Mountain beginning in the winter of 1945. John, who was almost eight when he arrived at Black Mountain, was one of three sons: David Corkran III, John and Robin. He attended Asheville Country Day School for two years before transferring to the Black Mountain school system. After his father left the college, the family settled in Black Mountain, and John graduated from Black Mountain High School in 1954. He graduated from Wesleyan University in 1958. Leaving law school in 1962, he went to work for the U.S Forest Service, first in campground design and construction, then as a Job Corps Center staff member. He returned to Wesleyan in 1966 as Director of Annual Giving. In 1969, he became Development Director of the Catlin Gabel School, headed by former BMC student Manvel Schauffler, in Portland, Oregon. Subsequently, he served as Development Director of the Fountain Valley School of Colorado and the Bush School in Seattle. In 1984 he received the Robert Bell Crow award for service to Independent Schools. From 1990 to 1999, he was Foundation Director for a Lutheran nursing and housing corporation. In 2001, he retired as Development Director of Trinity Lutheran College. In 2007 he and his wife Toni retired to Black Mountain.

Cramer, Isaac Doughton (March 27, 1915-January 21, 1995)

Isaac Doughton Cramer was born March 27, 1915 in Camden, New Jersey. He attended the Moorestown Friends' School in New Jersey from 1929 to 1933. On the recommendation of Frank Aydelotte, President of Swarthmore College and brother-in-law of John Andrew Rice, he enrolled at

Black Mountain College in September 1933, making him one of the first students at the new college. He graduated on December 7, 1937. Cramer taught school in Rochester, New York for four years before being drafted and spending three years in England. He received his M.S. degree in Social Work from Columbia University. He worked for the American Heart Association, retiring as Executive Director in Rhode Island.

Cramer's memoir describes the college, students, and professors, as well as the culture and philosophy of the school.

Currier, Gwendolyn (November 16, 1921-May 31, 1999)

Gwendolyn Currier Jamieson was born on November 16, 1921 in Moulmein, Burma to Raymond Currier and Edith Gould. Her father was secretary to The American Mission to Lepers, Inc. and was located in Burma until Gwendolyn was two. She attended Westfield High School from 1936-1939, and then New Jersey College for Women from 1939-1941. She applied and was accepted to Black Mountain College from 1942-1944 and attended the 1943 and 1944 summer sessions. She played the cello and studied with Heinrich Jalowetz. She married Edward Boardman "Jimmie" Jamieson (April 29, 1920-December 31, 1962), a Black Mountain College student from 1938-42 whom she met on a visit to the college when he was on alternative service as conscientious objector. Jimmie Jamieson taught at New Canaan Country School and the Gordon School in Providence. After his sudden death of a heart attack in 1962, Gwendolyn Jamieson completed her degree in English literature at Rhode Island College. She played cello with the Rhode Island Philharmonic and taught at the Rectory School, where she worked with dyslexic children.

de Graaff, Franziska "Frances" (October 11, 1904- October 22, 1997)

Franziska "Frances" de Graaff was born October 11, 1904 in Leyden, Holland. She studied Russian, romance languages and literature and received her doctorate in language and literature from the University of Leyden in 1933. From 1933 until 1936 she worked in Moscow as a translator and continued her studies on Russian poet Sergey Esenin. She returned to Holland and taught Russian and French. She immigrated to the United States in 1939. She taught Russian at Reed College in Portland, Oregon for two years. It was there that she heard about Black Mountain College. She was a member of the faculty at Black Mountain from the fall of 1941 through the 1944 summer session. She took a leave-of-absence for the 1943 summer to study at the University of Wisconsin. In the summer of 1944, a conflict broke out among faculty and students resulting in de Graaff's resignation. Some of the correspondence in this collection pertains to that event. After leaving Black Mountain College, de Graaff

first taught at Wells College and then from 1947 until her retirement in 1973 at Bryn Mawr and Haverford Colleges in Pennsylvania. While in Pennsylvania, she became Chair of the Russian department which she expanded to include undergraduate and graduate programs and was awarded the Lindback Award for Excellence in Teaching.

Dreier, Theodore Sr. (May 21, 1902- May 7, 1997)

Dreier, Barbara Loines (February 18, 1907 -March 6, 2006)

Theodore Dreier was one of the founders of Black Mountain College. Born in Brooklyn, New York, Dreier earned a B.A. degree from Harvard College in 1923 and a B.S.degree from Harvard's Engineering School in 1925. He and Barbara Loines Dreier (Bryn Mawr, A.B., 1928, English Literature and Art History) were married in 1928. From 1926 to 1930 and from 1950 to 1962, Ted Dreier worked for the General Electric Co. in New York State. In 1930 Dreier joined the faculty of Rollins College in Winter Park, Florida where he met John Andrew Rice, another faculty member. Both men left amid faculty controversy and founded Black Mountain College in 1933. Dreier, his wife Barbara, and their four children, Theodore, Jr., Mark, Edward and Barbara, lived on the campus. Dreier remained at Black Mountain until 1949, serving at various times as teacher, fund-raiser, treasurer and rector. During his later years at General Electric he was a section manager in the Knowles Atomic Power Laboratory, supervised by Admiral Hyman G. Rickover, to develop a power source to drive the first atomic submarine. He also helped organize and administer advanced engineering courses in the laboratory. In their later years, the Dreiers were teachers of the Transcendental Meditation technique. They lived at the Maharishi University of Management in Fairfield, Iowa and spent summers at their home on Martha's Vineyard. Barbara Beate Dreier (August 9, 1946-), daughter of Theodore and Barbara Dreier, was born at the college. As a toddler she sat on some very distinguished knees, including those of Buckminster Fuller. She was two-and-a-half years old when her parents left and her father resumed his career at General Electric. She attended Radcliffe (Harvard College) graduating in1968 with a B.A. degree in biology. She received her M.F.A. in Graphic Design from Yale University in 1975. She, as were her parents, is a teacher of the Transcendental Meditation technique. She held several design and administrative positions in the TM Movement. She later joined a long term program Maharishi set up called Mother Divine, "designed for a group of single ladies desiring to hasten their personal evolution doing long daily meditations while at the same time creating a (scientifically measurable) coherent and peaceful atmosphere in the surrounding population." During this time she also studied Maharishi's Vedic Science and helped to develop short courses for meditators. She worked with her parents to develop, in an environmentally sensitive way, land in the Adirondacks owned by extended family and helped design and build a pair of condo buildings in Iowa based on the principles of Sthapatya-Ved, the ancient Vedic Science of Architecture. She is a trustee of Maharishi University of Management in Fairfield, Iowa, which is the flagship university of Maharishi's consciousness-based education.

Dreier, Theodore Jr. (June 21, 1929-)

Theodore "Ted" Dreier, Jr. was born in Albany, New York, near where his father worked for the General Electric Company. He came with his parents to Black Mountain College in the fall of 1933 at its founding. He was four-and-a-half years old. He felt closely connected to the Black Mountain College community and enjoyed being invited to play children's parts in various plays. His initial schooling was local. For high school he attended the Putney School in Putney, Vermont. He attended Black Mountain College from September 1947 through the spring of 1949. He took classes with Josef Albers, Charlotte Schlesinger, Erwin Bodky, Max Dehn, Theodore Dreier (his father), Mary Caroline Richards, Merce Cunningham, and Charles Olson. In the fall of 1949 he transferred to Harvard where he majored in music and graduated cum laude in 1952. He studied cello in Detmold, Germany for a year but decided to remain an amateur musician. For a profession, he pursued an interest in psychiatry. He studied at Temple University

Medical School in Philadelphia; Internship at San Francisco General Hospital; then, in the Boston area, psychiatric training at Massachusetts General Hospital, McLean Hospital, and Children's Hospital. He obtained certificates in General Psychiatry, Child Psychiatry, and Geriatric Psychiatry. He and his wife Katharine "Kit" live in Belmont, Massachusetts. They have four children who have grown up and moved on. Ted, now retired, still enjoys writing poetry, some of it tuned into his Black Mountain College experiences. The Dreiers both enjoy singing in the Harvard Radcliffe Chorus.

Dreyfus, Charles (May 20, 1927-)

Dreyfus, Fanny Hobart (November 17, 1928-January 24, 2012)

Charles Dreyfus was born May 20, 1927 in Paris, France to engineer Pierre Dreyfus and Marie Baur Dreyfus. He attended Lycée Cornot in France from 1939 to 1940. From 1940 to 1942 he went to the École Pratique d'industrie in Marseille, France. While living in France, Dreyfus traveled through Europe and Africa. He came to the United States with his family in 1942 after the Nazis occupied France. He finished his early education at the Stuyvesant High School in New York City from 1942 to 1944. He also taught young boys French. After his graduation from high school, he enlisted with the French army and returned to France in 1944. On his return to the United States he heard about Black Mountain through a friend. Dreyfus attended the college for the 1946 winter and spring quarters and the 1946-1947 academic year. He studied a general curriculum including history, art, philosophy and literature. He married fellow Black Mountain College student Fanny Hobart. He attended the New School for Social Research in New York and later the University of California at Berkeley. In France he worked for a French automobile enterprise, an American chemical company, and lastly a textile manufacturing company which connected him to his great-grandparents who had a spinning and weaving plant in Alsace. The grandson of Captain Alfred Dreyfus of the "Dreyfus Affair," he has been active in efforts to preserve his grandfather's legacy.

Fanny Hobart was born in Brooklyn, New York on November 17, 1928 to John S. Hobart and Dora Slobodin Hobart. She had one brother who was killed in action during World War II. She attended High School of Music and Art from 1942 to 1943 and then transferred to Midwood High School from 1943 to 1945. She graduated with an academic diploma. Hobart attended Black Mountain College from 1945 to 1947. She married fellow Black Mountain College student Charles Dreyfus. She studied music at Black Mountain, at the Mannes Music School in New York and at the San Francisco Conservatory. After her marriage to Charles Dreyfus she lived in Paris where she was a homemaker and performed with chamber music groups. She taught music for fifteen years at the École Active Bilingue, a progressive French-English bilingual group of schools in Paris.

Evarts, John (September 16, 1908-July 28(?), 1989)

John Evarts, composer and pianist, was a founding member of the faculty in the fall of 1933. Following musical training at Yale, Evarts studied in Munich and Berlin. He taught at Black Mountain College from 1933 until he joined the army in 1942. He was gifted at improvisation and, before arriving at Black Mountain College, had often accompanied silent movies. At the college he played for skits and performances. After the war Evarts stayed in Germany to assist with reconstruction. He was employed by the State Department as a cultural administrator, helping to restore Germany's cultural infrastructure, particularly as it related to concerts, music festivals and orchestras. After 1951, Evarts lived in France and Germany working for UNESCO. From 1959-1974 he was editor of *The World of Music*, a bulletin of the International Music Council (UNESCO) in association with the International Institute for Comparative Music Studies and Documentation (Berlin). Shortly before his death, he was awarded a Distinguished Service Cross from the Federal Republic of Germany in recognition of his work during the occupation.

The studies and teaching of Black Mountain faculty and students had been disrupted. Some were in service; others were awaiting orders.

Some were working in wartime industries and many moved to New York to share apartments and work.

- August 9, 1940, letter, Sue Herman [Mrs. William Herman] to Evarts, regarding recent visit to Cotuit, Massachusetts.
- July 11, 1941, letter, John Evarts to Mr. Douglas, thanking him for his generous check for the college.
- July 14, 1941, letter, Jack Fox to Mr. John "Jack" Merrill, letter of introduction for John Evarts who was on a fundraising trip to the West Coast.
- March 10, 1942, letter, Lawrence S. Kubie, M.D. to Mr. Frank Dupont, letter of introduction for John Evarts. Robert Kubie, presumably his son, was a student at the 1941 Summer Work Camp.

- August 1942, letter, Lisa Jalowetz (Aronson) (BMC student) to Evarts regarding her work in various plays at the Woodstock Playhouse (the typeface used in the letterhead was often used at BMC and the stationary was probably printed on the BMC press).
- August 10 [1942], Fernando Leon (BMC student) to John Evarts, references Evarts leaving the college to go into the military, and describes Leon's life as an engineering student at Columbia University.
- August 12, 1942, letter, Hyalie Yamins (Green) (BMC student) to Evarts concerning her upcoming marriage to Leo and her job as housekeeper and nanny.
- August 14, 1942, letter, "Jimmy" to Evarts, regarding Yale's summer term and his teaching assignments [in his BMC journal, Evarts mentions three close friends: Marshall, Jimmy Shute, and Jimmy Leyburn. - September 21, 1942, letter, Fred Stone (BMC student) thanking Evarts for his letter of sympathy for the death of Stone's brother.
- September 25, 1942, letter, Leslie Katz to Evarts, regarding new job at the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System (IBS). He asks advice of Evarts regarding a "liberal and progressive" IBS project for college students, that he is writing short stories and found a new apartment in the Village.
- September 26, 1942, postcard, Terrell Jackson to Evarts, from Camp Young, California, asking Evarts to write.
- September 30, 1942, letter, Fernando Leon to Evarts, regarding Black Mountain College news, old friends, and Leon's studies at Columbia.
- October 8, 1942, letter, Barbara Beatty (Dwight) (BMC student) to Evarts, regarding her upcoming marriage to Duncan and questions about life at Black Mountain College.
- October 8, 1942, letter, "John" to Evarts asking about Black Mountain College and Evarts's army assignment.

Falk, Gustave Stephen Jr. (May 27, 1926-February 14, 2011)

Gustave Falk, Jr. was born in Cleveland, Ohio on May 27, 1926 to tile contractor Gustave Falk, Sr. and Amanda Louise Pfriem Falk. Falk attended West High School from 1938 to 1944 and after graduation, attended the Cleveland School of Art from 1944 to 1947. He was in the Army and spent time during service in the Philippine Islands and Tokyo, Japan. He attended Black Mountain College under the GI Bill for the 1948 spring and summer sessions. He studied design with Josef Albers and drawing and painting with Ilya Bolotowsky. He left Black Mountain at the end of the summer to continue his studies in New York with Willem de Kooning, with whom he had studied at the summer session. Falk was a noted fashion illustrator and medical illustrator. His work was published in the *Cleveland Clinic Magazine* and McGraw-Hill publications, among others. He was teacher and director of the l'ecole municipal d'art de Chalon-sur-Soane in France from 1989-1993. He also taught drawing at the Lacoste School of the Arts in France which was founded by his uncle Bernard A. Pfriem.

Fick, Jorge (July 22, 1932- March 17, 2004)

Jorge Fick was one of a number of students at the Society of Arts and Crafts and Cass Technical High School in Detroit who enrolled at Black Mountain College. He was a student intermittently from the spring of 1952 through the 1955 summer session. He studied writing with Charles Olson and Robert Creeley and painting with Joseph Fiore, Franz Kline, and Esteban Vicente. He also studied art in Guadalajara, Mexico. He graduated in 1955 with Franz Kline as his examiner. In New York he shared a studio with Kline and continued to study painting. In 1958 he moved to Santa Fe, New Mexico where he was an active member of the art community. He married Black Mountain student Cynthia Homire. They had a pottery studio, The Fickery, from 1972 until 1983 where they sold their pottery. After their divorce, Fick continued to paint in La Cienega until his death. He exhibited widely in New Mexico and Arizona. Fick's paintings and works on paper are in the collections of the Harwood Museum, Taos, New Mexico; Museum of Fine Arts, Santa Fe, New Mexico; Phoenix Art Museum, Phoenix, Arizona; Roswell Museum, Roswell, New Mexico; Smith College Art Museum, North Hampton, Massachusetts; and the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York, New York.

Fiore, Mary Falconer Fitton (December 2, 1924-)

During World War II, Mary Fitton Fiore served in the Women's Army Corps. She graduated from Radcliffe College in 1946. She enrolled at Black Mountain College in the fall of 1949. After her marriage to Joseph Fiore (February 3, 1925-September 8, 2008), a former student who taught art, she remained at the college as faculty wife until the college closed the Lake Eden campus in September 1956. Fitton took a general curriculum with an emphasis on literature and writing. As a member of M.C. Richards's class she helped to edit the June 1951 *Black Mountain College Review*. When the college was threatened with foreclosure, a loan from her family helped to forestall foreclosure proceedings. After her marriage to Fiore and the birth of their son Tom, Fitton was mother and homemaker for her family. She remained active in community life, participating in theater productions and sitting in on Charles Olson's classes.

Fox, Lawrence (June 30, 1925-June 1, 2007)

Lawrence "Larry" Fox, a native of New York City, acted as a young boy in several Broadway productions. He enrolled at Black Mountain College in the spring of 1943. He left in October 1943 to serve in the Navy. He played baseball to entertain the troops. He returned to Black Mountain in the spring of 1946 and remained for the 1946-47 academic year. He graduated from Syracuse University. He received his Ph.D. in organizational behavior from the University of Michigan. Fox was executive director for a consortium of ten colleges and vice chancellor for university relations at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center. Fox died in 2007 and was survived by his long-time companion, Mirande Geissbuhler Holl, whom he had met at Black Mountain College.

Geissbuhler, Mirande (December 4, 1928-)

Mirande Geissbuhler Holl was a student at Black Mountain College for the 1947 spring semester and the 1947-48 academic year. She studied under M.C. Richards and Ilya Bolotowsky. While at Black Mountain College she met student and artist Harry Holl whom she married. The Holls moved to Estacada, Oregon where they were members of Viewpoint Community, a community created by John Wallen and Black Mountain students. They then moved to Cape Cod where her parents, both of whom were artists, had a home and studio. Harry Holl established a pottery studio Scargo Pottery. After their divorce, Mirande Holl had a nursery school and summer camp on Cape Cod in Yarmouth. The school had animals and the children grew their food. She and Harry Holl remained friends and their four daughters continue to run the pottery studio. Mirande and former Black Mountain student Larry Fox were long-time companions until his death in 2007.

Gershkow, Clara (January 22, 1918- April 24, 2007)

Clara Gershkow Hofberg was born in Brooklyn, New York on January 22, 1918. Gershkow attended North High School in Minnesota from 1933 to 1935 and the University of Minnesota from 1938 to 1943. She also practiced music at MacPhail School of Music in Minneapolis, Minnesota and taught piano. Before attending the Summer Music Institute at Black Mountain College in 1944, Gershkow was a piano student of Joanna Grauden who was teaching that summer. When she left Black Mountain at the end of the summer, she followed the Graudans to New York to continue her studies. Eventually, she despaired of trying to pursue a career as a concert pianist. After her marriage to Leo Hofberg, she lived in New York and Lugano, Switzerland where her husband worked for British Decca. Later she and her husband moved to Arizona because of his health. There she was active in chamber music.

Goldsmith, Cornelia (June 16, 1924-September 14, 2011)

Cornelia "Nell" Goldsmith Heyns attended Black Mountain College from 1942 to 1944. She took a general curriculum with an emphasis on architecture, studying with Lawrence Kocher and Anatole Kopp. She also took drawing with Josef Albers and weaving with Anni Albers. She helped construct four music practice cubicles. At the end of the second year she was admitted to the Senior Division with architecture as her major. Goldsmith left Black Mountain after her second year to join the war effort. She enlisted in the Army and was assigned to Homestead Army Air Base in Homestead, Florida. She met her husband, an artist, at Homestead. They moved to the New Orleans area where Hugo Heyns had an architecture practice. She and her husband had seven children. She studied and taught ceramics as a hobby.

Goro, Fritz (1901- December 14, 1986)

Fritz Goro was born in Germany in 1901. He studied at the Bauhaus Weimar and later was a magazine art director and picture editor. In 1933 he and his wife Grete fled Germany to the United States. Goro taught photography in Paris, France from 1937 and worked as a science photographer for *Life Magazine* for four decades. Goro was a member of the guest faculty for the 1945 Summer Art Institute. Although he was scheduled for August 20th to September 8th, he had to cut his lectures short due to work for *Life*

Magazine after the dropping of the atomic bomb in August. Goro had documented the first plutonium produced and the first atomic-bomb test. He documented major scientific breakthroughs and pioneered technical innovations in photography. He died in Chappaqua, New York where he lived.

Goulet, Lorrie (August 17, 1925-)

Lorrie Goulet was born August 17, 1925 in New York City to theatrical booking agent Henry George Goulet and Rose Marie De Alba Goulet. Her family moved to California when she was a child. She attended Thomas Star King Middle School in Los Angeles from 1938 to 1940, John Marshall High School from 1940 to 1942, Metropolitan High School in 1942, and finally Fairfax High School from 1942 to 1943. After graduation, Goulet was admitted to Black Mountain College in the fall of 1943. She studied art with Josef Albers and woodworking with Mary Gregory as well as drama, writing and history. In the summer of 1944 she studied direct carving in stone and wood with José de Creeft. She left at the end of the 1944 summer to work as an apprentice to de Creeft, whom she married. Goulet taught direct carving at the Art Students League. She also writes poetry and paints. Her work has been the subject of two monographs: *drawings and poetry* and *The Sculptures of Lorrie Goulet; and five meditations on sculpture*. She was honored by the National Museum of Women in the Arts with a solo exhibition "Fifty Years of Making Sculpture." Her work is in major collections including the Joseph H. Hirshhorn Museum & Sculpture Garden in Washington, D.C. and the National Academy of Design in New York.

Green, Jesse Dawes (February 9, 1928- November 3, 2011)

Jesse Dawes Green was born in Stanley, Wisconsin on February 9, 1928 to insurance agent Jesse Green and Arleva Cooper Green. He attended Stanley High School from 1942 to 1945 and was enrolled at the Robert Hutchins Great Books College, a special preparatory school, at the University of Chicago, from 1945 to 1946 where he received his high school certificate. Green was enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1946-47 and 1947-48 academic years and for the 1948 summer session. He took courses in history, literature and drama. He obtained his B.A. degree from Reed College, his M.A. from the University of California at Berkeley and his Ph.D. from Northwestern University. He taught at the Catlin Gabel School in Portland, where a number of former Black Mountain students taught. From 1958 to 1994 he was a teacher of English, speech and modern languages and also head of the English Department at Chicago State University. He published articles on Joseph Conrad, Herman Melville and others. He wrote two books on the anthropologist Frank Hamilton Cushing and a third book *Wrestling* with Old Heroes -- Again. Green was also a potter and poet.

Gropius, Beate Eveliene (December 19, 1925-September 7, 2014)

Beate Eveliene "Ati" Gropius Forberg Johansen attended Black Mountain College from the summer of 1943 through the summer of 1946, including the summers of 1944, and 1945. She was the daughter of Walter and Ise Gropius. Ati and her parents fled Germany in 1933, traveling to England and later the United States. Walter Gropius, educator, architect and founder of the Bauhaus, accepted an invitation to teach architecture at the Graduate School of Design at Harvard University. From 1938-52 he was Chairman of the Department of Architecture. Gropius first visited Black Mountain in December 1937. His former Bauhaus colleagues, Josef and Anni Albers and Xanti Schawinksy, were teaching there, and the visit was an occasion both for a visit with friends and for an informal discussion of plans for the development of the Lake Eden property which the college had purchased in June 1937.

While a student at Black Mountain College, Ati studied art with Josef Albers. After her graduation in 1946, she married architect Charles Forberg, a Black Mountain student. Her second marriage was to architect John Johansen. She was instrumental in the preservation of her father's legacy both in the United States and in Germany. She was on the faculty of the DeCordova Sculpture Park and Museum in Lincoln, Massachusetts and assisted Historic New England restore Gropius House, her childhood home in Lincoln. Ati was a graphic designer and an illustrator of children's books. She gave courses and lectures at the Museum of Modern Art in New York; the Santa Fe Art Institute in New Mexico; at The Boston Architectural Center; at Simmons College; and at the Historic New England; the Worcester Art Museum; Bridgewater State College; the State University of New York in Dutchess County; at the Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center; and the Walter Gropius Schule in Erfurt, Germany.

Hall, James (May 11, 1916-May 28, 1982)

James Hall was twenty-three when he enrolled at Black Mountain for the fall of 1940. After graduation from Lyndhurst High School in New Jersey, he had worked at various jobs while saving enough money for one semester at Louisiana State University. At Black Mountain he was given a full scholarship. He was at the college the year they built the Studies Building and took a general curriculum. He left at the end of the 1941 spring term expecting to be drafted. He was rejected by the army after, in response to a

question about his willingness to fight, he explained that he had "composed my mind to that." He met his wife Frances "Franny" Benn Hall in New York where they both rented rooms above the Town and Country School. Franny had completed her M.A. degree in public speaking. They moved to Berkeley were he obtained his B.A. in literature and political science. They then moved to New York with their first son Parnell. There they applied to Windsor Mountain School in Lenox, Massachusetts, which seemed of the private schools to be the most like Black Mountain. Except for a break for Hall to obtain his M.A. degree at the University of Wisconsin, they remained there for twenty-five years until the school closed. James taught literature and Franny taught theater. They then taught at the Stockbridge School and as adjunct professors at the Berkshire Community College. Among other Black Mountain influences, James Hall instituted a work program at Windsor Mountain and brought Sam Brown, and Lucian and Jane Slater Marquis to teach there. He also referred students to Black Mountain.

Halstead, Alberta (September 26, 1907- January 13, 2009)

Alberta Halstead enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1944 Summer Music Institute on the recommendation of Eduard Steuermann, who was teaching for the summer. Hamilton, John William (April 21, 1924-October 17, 1984)

Hamilton, Elizabeth Fant (January 25, 1924-June 25, 2003)

John William Hamilton III and Elizabeth "Libby" Hamilton were students at Black Mountain College for the 1951-52 and 1952-53 regular sessions and for the 1952 summer session. Libby Hamilton was among the few Carolinians at the college. The Hamiltons met at the University of North Carolina where she was doing graduate work in comparative literature (she had completed her B.A. at Women's College (University of North Carolina /Greensboro)) and John was an undergraduate student in mathematics and art. He also was active in the veterans's association. After they married, they decided to enroll at Black Mountain where John could continue his art. At Black Mountain John studied art with Hazel Larsen Archer, Joseph Fiore, Franz Kline and Jack Tworkov. Libby was homemaker for their two children, Michael born October 1951 in Hendersonville, North Carolina and their daughter Katie who was born at the college in January 1953. She sat in on classes and was active in college activities. John Hamilton worked in graphic arts for local historic sites in Eastern North Carolina, worked in publishing including as an editor for Chrysler Defense Engineering, as an electronic engineer for Cornell Dubilier designing capacitors and working with electronic inks, and at times as a laborer on projects such as construction of the Hartwell Reservoir in Anderson, South Carolina. He also worked with the local Park Services in Sanford, North Carolina. Libby Hamilton received her M.A. degree from Appalachian State University. She taught literature and creative writing at Chowan College and at Campbell College in North Carolina. The Hamiltons moved frequently, but were always engaged in the local art scene as well as pursuing interests in hypnosis, Irish lore, pottery and weaving.

Hamlin, Wilfred G. (May 18, 1918 – August 4, 2009)

Wilfred "Will" Hamlin enrolled in Black Mountain in 1940 after three years at Antioch College. He studied with Robert Wunsch, Elsa Kahl, Kenneth Kurtz, Fred Mangold, Erwin Straus, John Stix, and Fritz Hansgirg. He helped with college publicity and printed publications, including newsletters, concert and drama programs, and an announcement for an exhibition of hardware jewelry by Anni Albers. He remained at the college for the fall of 1942 as a member of the staff to help with college publicity. He left Black Mountain College in 1943 and worked in editorial services. He then obtained his Ph.D. from Union Graduate School. On June 11, 1944, he married Elizabeth "Betty" Brett (September 7, 1920-April 19, 1968) also a Black Mountain student, whose brother had known Will at Antioch. Betty Brett Hamlin

died in 1968 of pulmonary fibrosis. From 1948 until his retirement in 2001, Will Hamlin taught literature, psychology and education at Goddard College.

Harmon, Cliff Franklin (June 26, 1923 -)

Cliff F. Harmon studied at the Bisttram School of Fine Arts in Los Angeles and at the Taos Valley Art School in New Mexico. It was in Taos in 1948 that he met his wife Barbara Sayre (August 8, 1927 -), also a student at the Bisttram School. They settled in Taos where they built their adobe house and studios. Cliff Harmon enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1950 spring semester. He expected to study with Josef Albers, who was no longer at the college, and to explore Bauhaus design. Instead he studied with Joseph Fiore. Nevertheless Albers' color theory exerted a strong influence on his work. Harmon has painted the landscape in a semi-abstract style, "Earth Forms." In 1996, he celebrated fifty years of painting in Taos with a retrospective show at three venues: the Van Vechten-Lineberry Gallery Taos Art Museum, the Stables Gallery of the Taos Art Association, and the Total Arts Gallery. In 2011-12 he was honored by an exhibition *Cliff Harmon 65 Years in Taos* at the Blumenshein Home & Museum. Barbara's father Fred Grayson Sayre was a California landscape artist. Her own work draws on fairy tales and fantasy – the World of Wilderwish. She was honored with a sixty-five year retrospective of her work at the Blumenschein Home & Museum and received the Blumenschein Award for her lifetime contribution to the cultural life of the area.

Hendrickson, George Windsor (October 16, 1914-January 19, 1991)

George Hendrickson enrolled at Black Mountain College for four years from 1935-1939. His focus was on art and on theater. He studied with both Josef Albers and Xanti Schawinsky. He graduated with Samuel Selden, who taught theater at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and was a director of the Carolina Playmakers, as his examiner. In the summer of 1938 he assisted Xanti Schawinsky in the design of the Pennsylvania exhibit at the New York World's Fair. From 1939 to 1941 he worked in little theater as a scene designer and instructor while attending Yale University for this M.F.A. in theater (1942). During the war he served as a press censor for the United States Army. He was Associate Technical Director of Le Petit Théâtre du Vieux Carré in New Orleans from 1947-53, and from 1946-1985, he taught speech and theater and directed and designed plays for the Tulane Playhouse at Tulane University.

Holl, Harry (September 25, 1922-October 2, 2014)

Harry Holl was born in the Bronx in New York City and attended the New York High School of Music and Art. He received a fellowship to study at the former Beaux Arts School of Design and when twenty received a Tiffany Foundation Grant, enabling him to work on a more independent basis. He was drafted at age twenty-one while pursuing his art studies. Returning to New York after World War II, Holl studied at the Art Students League. He used his G.I. Bill to further study art at Black Mountain College. He first enrolled for the 1947 summer and remained for the 1947-48 regular session. Holl studied with abstract painter Ilya Bolotowsky, who was teaching when Josef Albers was on sabbatical. At Black Mountain Holl taught a sculpture course as a student teacher. He met and married another student Mirande Geissbuhler. In 1948 the Holls joined the community formed by John Wallen and students in Estacada, Oregon. Eventually they settled on Cape Cod where Geissbuhler's parents, both artists, had a home and studio. In 1952 Holl founded Scargo Pottery & Art Gallery in Dennis, Massachusetts. The couple, who had four children, were later divorced. The Cape Museum of Fine Arts held a retrospective of his work in 2002. The exhibition included examples of Holl's paintings and bronze sculptures as well as his pottery. Holl helped to establish several of the principal arts-related institutions on Cape Cod.

Jackson, T.R. (October 23, 1932-)

T.R. "Tommy" Jackson was a student at Black Mountain College for the spring of 1951, the 1951-52 regular sessions, and the 1953 spring and fall sessions. He also attended the 1951 and 1953 summer programs. Jackson had attended the progressive Windsor Mountain School in Lenox, Massachusetts. He worked on various projects at the college under different names including the Black Mountain Engineers and the Black Mountain Sports Car Services. He also was interested in photography, graphics and printing, and in 1953, he brought his own press to the college to avoid what he felt was a messy work space where he had limited time. He had a number of presses at Black Mountain, one of which was the Grapnel Press. He was a printer for the *Black Mountain College Review*, published in a single issue in June 1951 He also printed *Ceremonies in Bachelor* Space by Russell Edson in November 1951 as well as concert programs. Later in Vermont, where he did electronic and computer work, he used Black Mountain in the name of his various enterprises including Black Mountain Engineers which created hardware for Logic Associates.

Jennerjahn, Elizabeth Schmitt (June 11, 1923-March 3, 2007)

Elizabeth "Betty" Jennerjahn first enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1944 Summer Art Institute. At the time she was a student at Milwaukee State Teachers College. She applied for entrance to regular sessions and returned for the winter and spring 1945 quarters. She left to study dance in New York and at the University of Colorado. She returned with her husband Warren "Pete" Jennerjahn in the summer of 1948 and remained as a student for the 1948-49 year. From the fall of 1948 through the summer of 1949 she was student teacher in dance, and in the fall of 1949 she was appointed to the dance faculty. She took a leave-of-absence in the summer of 1951 but remained at the college for the summer to study with Katherine Litz. She then joined Pete Jennerjahn in France. On Long Island she taught at the Waldorf School at Adelphi University. She also painted and made wall-hangings of fiber.

Jennerjahn, Warren P. (June 15, 1922-)

Warren P. "Pete" Jennerjahn enrolled at Black Mountain College in the summer of 1948 with his wife Betty, a former student. He had completed his M.S. degree in art at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. At Black Mountain in the fall he was both student and assistant to Josef Albers. In the spring and summer of 1949 he was instructor in art. In the fall of 1949 he was appointed to the faculty to teach art and remained through the spring of 1951. He left the college to study in France on the G.I. Bill. Jennerjahn taught for thirty-three years at Adelphi University on Long Island, as well as Cooper Union, Hunter College, and at the Sedona Arts Center. In addition to being an artist, Jennerjahn was a jazz musician. He and his wife were pioneers in creating multi-media forms of expression. At Black Mountain he taught an influential Light Sound Movement Workshop which explored multimedia forms of performance. This was a precursor of what is now known as Performance Art. Jennerjahn's art work has been shown in over three hundred exhibitions in sixteen states, as well as Paris and Madrid.

Kahler, Alice Loewy (October 17, 1900-September 1992)

Alice Kahler was the widow of Erich Kahler (October 14, 1885-June 28, 1970), a noted European-American literary scholar, essayist, and teacher who taught at Black Mountain College in the summer of 1947. Erich Kahler taught at the New School for Social Research, Cornell University and at Princeton University. The Kahler-Kreis (Kahler Circle), a group of intellectual friends, met at the Kahler home at One Evelyn Place in Princeton from 1939 into the 1970s. Alice Kahler died in 1992.

Kocher, Lawrence (May 9, 1936-)

Lawrence "Larry" Kocher is the son of Margaret and A. Lawrence Kocher (July 14, 1885-June 6, 1969), who taught architecture at Black Mountain College from the fall of 1940 through the 1943 summer session. Larry Kocher was four years old when his father came to Black Mountain College to teach architecture and direct its construction program. Kocher's father designed the Studies Building, a barn, music practice cubicles, and two small houses, one for the music teacher and his wife, and one for the kitchen staff and other black workers. Larry Kocher taught high school history.

Kopp, Anatole (1915-May 6, 1990)

Anatole Kopp was born in St. Petersburg, Russia and educated in Paris. He studied at the Sorbonne, the École Spéciale d'Architecture, and at the École des Beaux-Arts. At the outbreak of World War II, he left France and moved to the U.S. where he studied architecture at MIT. In 1942, Kopp and his wife Marianne Bjerke Kopp, a chemistry student at MIT, enrolled at the 1942 Summer Work Camp at Black Mountain College for a week. In October 1942, Kopp was appointed instructor in architecture. He remained through the 1943 spring semester. In addition to his courses in building structures and architectural design, he taught courses in stage studies and construction. At Black Mountain he worked as an assistant to Robert Wunsch in the theater program. He designed drama sets for *Ethan Frome* and other productions. Kopp also directed the construction of a building housing four music practice cubicles which had been designed by Lawrence Kocher and which was constructed by architecture students. When Kopp left Black Mountain, he returned to MIT to complete his thesis, a theater design for the Lake Eden campus. He then served in the United States Army. In January 1945 he returned to France and resumed his architectural profession. Kopp's architectural projects include housing, school and cultural projects in the Paris area and sport and cultural construction in Algeria. He is author of *Town and Revolution: Soviet Architecture and City Planning, 1917-1935*.

Krasne, Lucille (February 20, 1930-)

She also is an avid Argentine tango dancer and organizes tango and salsa events.

Krowinski, Felix Thomas (March 23, 1921-October 4, 2004)

Felix Thomas Krowinski, Sr., a native of Niagara Falls, New York, graduated from the Buffalo State Hospital School of Nursing in 1943. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II and then attended Black Mountain College for the 1947-1948 regular term and the 1948 summer session. Following Black Mountain College, he resumed his nursing career, working as a psychiatric nurse at Bellevue Hospital in New York. He also worked as a nurse in Sumatra and at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Montrose, New York. He married Josephine St. Angelo and they had a son. While at Black Mountain College, he photographed the campus, landscapes, students, and faculty, as well as events. Hundreds of his photographs are included in the collection.

Krowinski placed most of the photographs in an album, but the album was disintegrating when it was donated to the Black Mountain College Project. Mary Emma Harris, Project Director, photocopied the album so there would be a record of Krowinski's arrangement, and then removed the photographs discovering identifications and other information on the reverse side of the image.

BOX 14 LaFarge-Moore

LaFarge, Timothy (March 14, 1930-)

Timothy LaFarge was a student at Black Mountain College for the 1948-49 through the 1951-52 regular sessions. He also attended the summer sessions from 1949 through 1953. His primary interest was dance although he took a general curriculum. He first studied with Katherine Litz at the college and then with Merce Cunningham in the summers of 1952 and 1953 and performed in *Dime a Dance* in 1953. He graduated with Cunningham as his examiner. After Black Mountain College, LaFarge continued to study with Cunningham in New York and danced briefly with the Company. He also danced with Midi Garth, with the Dance Drama Company, and the Amato Opera + Ballet. When he left dance, he studied forestry and obtained his Ph.D. from Michigan State University. LaFarge was a professional forester with a specialization in applied forest genetics research and operations with the Southeastern Forest Experiment Station in Macon, Georgia and Eastern Zone & Geneticist for the Tree Improvement Program of the Southern Region in Atlanta, Georgia. He authored technical papers on his research. After his retirement, he moved to San Francisco, California.

Landreau, Anthony N. (April 2, 1930 – May 30, 2009)

Anthony "Tony" Landreau taught weaving at Black Mountain College from the fall of 1954 through the 1956 summer session. Born in Washington, D.C. in 1930, he served in the Navy in the Pacific for two years in the late 1940s. After the war, he moved to New York City to further his interest in abstract painting. While there, he studied weaving with Dorothy Liebes, a prominent weaver and textile designer who worked with architects. In Venice Beach, California in the late 1950s, he was a painter and member of the "beat" community of artists and writers. He returned to Washington in the 1960s where he painted and made his living restoring oil paintings. After working for a year with a weaver's cooperative in Bolivia, he was curator and director of the Textile Museum in Washington and then Curator of Education at the Carnegie Institute in Pittsburgh. During his museum career, he made a number of trips to Turkey, Iran and other textile centers in the Middle East and became an expert on Turkish textiles. He also wrote several books and articles. Following his museum work, Landreau briefly went into the rug business. He retired to Deer Isle, Maine, where he helped his sister run her inn. At age 62 he enrolled in a graduate program in anthropology at Temple University in Philadelphia (Ph.D. 1995). He wrote his dissertation on "Anatolian Rug Weaving: Mirror of Change." After his move to Yakima, Washington to be near his son Christopher, who was born at Black Mountain, and his family, he was a popular lecturer in anthropology and sociology at Yakima Valley Community College and also took up painting again. Landreau married twice and had three sons.

Lionni, Leo (May 5, 1910 - October 11, 1999)

Leo Lionni, a painter, sculptor, graphic designer, educator, and writer and illustrator of children's books, was a member of the summer arts faculty at Black Mountain College in 1946. Lionni was born in Amsterdam, Holland in 1910 to an Italian family. Although he received a doctorate degree in economics in 1935 from the University of Genoa, he devoted himself to advertising design. With political unrest in Italy, he immigrated in 1939 to Philadelphia where he took a position with the N.W. Ayer advertising agency. He eventually acquired major accounts including Ford Motors and Chrysler Plymouth. He also designed ads for *Ladies Home Journal*. Lionni commissioned works by Saul Steinberg, Andy Warhol, Willem de Kooning and Fernand Léger. He later was art director for the Container Corporation's "International Series." From 1948 through 1960, he was art director of *Fortune* magazine and designer of other Time/Life publications. He also maintained outside clients, including the Museum of Modern Art, for which he designed the *Family of Man* catalogue. Lionni returned to Italy where he wrote and illustrated children's books. He also continued to sculpt and paint. Lionni is known for more than forty children's books, including *Inch by Inch, Swimmy*, and *Frederick*. He received the American Institute of Graphic Arts Gold Medal in 1984 and was a four-time winner of the prestigious Caldecott Honor Book award. Lionni died in 1999.

Lowinsky, Edward E. (January 12, 1908 – October 11, 1985)

Edward Lowinsky was a scholar of sixteenth-century music and an influential musicologist. He taught at Black Mountain College from the fall of 1942 through the 1947 summer session (with leaves of absence for the summer and fall of 1943 and the 1944 summer). Lowinsky was born in Stuttgart, Germany and obtained his Ph.D. from the University of Heidelberg in 1933. That same year he fled to the Netherlands where he lived until 1939. There he worked as music historian and teacher. In 1940 he immigrated to the United States with his wife Gretel J. Lowinsky, a violinist who also taught at Black Mountain. He left the college to accept a Guggenheim Fellowship. His controversial book *Secret Chromatic Art in the Netherlands Motet* was published by Columbia University Press in 1947, when he was at the college. He later taught at Queens College in New York (1947-56), the University of California at Berkeley (1956-61), and the University of Chicago (1961-76). Lowinsky was editor of the Monuments of Renaissance Music series (1964-77) and chaired the 1971 conference on Josquin de Prez. Most of his published articles were collected into a two-volume *Music in the Culture of the Renaissance* (1989), edited by his second wife, musicologist Bonnie J. Blackburn.

Lustig, Alvin (January 1, 1915-December 4, 1955)

Alvin Lustig, an art teacher at Black Mountain College in the summer of 1945, was a noted designer of books, graphics, and typefaces. Lustig studied design at Los Angeles City College, Art Center, and independently with Frank Lloyd Wright and painter Jean Charlot, who taught at Black Mountain College during the summer session in 1944. He began his career designing book jackets in 1937 in Los Angeles, California and in 1944, became Director of Visual Research for *Look* magazine. He also designed for *Fortune* magazine and the Girl Scouts of the United States. He was passionate about design education and developed design courses and workshops for Black Mountain College and the design department at Yale. He designed record albums, magazines, advertisements, commercial catalogs, annual reports and office spaces and textiles. Lustig also designed for New Directions Publishing, producing seventy iconic and innovative book jackets for the New Classics literary series from 1945 until his death in 1955. Lustig has been honored by the Art Directors Club Hall of Fame and the American Institute of Graphic Arts for his significant contributions to American design.

Malek, Bernard (October 16, 1920-April 25, 2007)

Bernard Malek heard about Black Mountain College when college faculty visited the Bronxville High School, a progressive school in New York where he was a student. The teachers there suggested Black Mountain would be a suitable college for two students, Malek and Frances Kuntz. They both enrolled in the fall of 1939 and remained for three years. Malek also attended the 1941 summer session. His primary interest was theater although he also took courses in music and art. Malek was not happy at Black Mountain, feeling that the drama activities at the college under the direction of Robert Wunsch were not professional. In their last year at the college Malek and Kuntz built a drama shed. She designed wigs using peanuts and other humble materials and together they designed the sets for a production of Moliere's The Physician in Spite of Himself. He left in 1942 and served in the war as a conscientious objector. He and Frances Kuntz married and both were active in theater life in New York. After the war he studied at the Neighborhood Playhouse in New York. He acted under the stage name John Hildebrand (also spelled Heldebrand). Roles included Kraft Theater (1947), Star in On the Waterfront (1954), and Tomasini in The Wrong Man (1956). He made his Broadway debut in Lillian Hellman's Monserrat (1949) as Zavala and as the Duke of Albany in King Lear (1950) (In both plays he is listed as Richard Malek). After his separation from Kuntz, he moved to California but was unable to break into the television and movie business there and had a landscaping business. He returned to New York to assist his parents who managed an apartment complex. In his later years he was interested in psychology.

Mamlok, Ursula (February 1, 1923-)

Ursula Mamlok attended the 1944 Summer Music Institute at Black Mountain College, possibly as a visitor. She was born in Berlin and fled Germany with her family in 1938 following Kristallnacht. The family moved to Equador before immigrating to the United States in 1941. In New York she studied at the Mannes School of Music and the Manhattan School of Music. She studied with Roger Sessions, Ralph Shapey and Eduard Steuermann. Mamlok composes primarily for chamber ensembles. She has taught at major universities and music schools including City University of New York and Temple University and the Mannes School of Music. She has received numerous awards.

Marquis, Lucian (January 5, 1921-January 21, 2005)

Lucian Marquis was a student at Black Mountain College from 1940-1942. In the summer of 1942, he remained at the college as a paid worker. Marguis had escaped with his family from Nazi Germany at the age of twelve. The family lived for a time in Rome before immigrating to Beverly Hills, California where he graduated from high school in 1937. After trying unsuccessfully to enlist in the military because of his German background, Marquis used his proficiency in German, French and Italian to monitor German radio broadcasts for the United Press. In 1943, he joined the 86th Blackhawk Division of the United States Army and served as a combat infantryman during the Battle of the Bulge and later as a scout and interrogator. Following the war, Marquis began his teaching career at Windsor Mountain School in Massachusetts. In 1947, he married Jane Slater (b. September 23, 1922), a graduate of Black Mountain College. He earned his M.A. degree from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1951 and a doctoral degree, also from UCLA, in 1959. He joined the political science faculty at the University of Oregon where he taught until 1966. He was the university's first director of its Honors College and received the Ersted Award for Distinguished Teaching. He also led one of the first anti-war protests against American involvement in Viet Nam. From 1966 until his retirement, he taught political science at Pitzer College and Claremont in California. The Lucian Marquis Library and Reading Room at Pitzer was named for him. He also taught at the Graduate Institute of St. John's University in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Martin, Bela (July 25, 1916-October 1, 2008)

Bela Martin was a student at Black Mountain College from the spring of 1935 through the 1940 spring term. He heard about Black Mountain College from Robert Wunsch, who taught Martin at Louisville Male High School before teaching at Black Mountain. Martin and his Louisville classmate Morton Steinau hitchhiked to Black Mountain to visit Wunsch and decided to enroll. Martin, one of Black Mountain's few athletic students, recalled that he could have gone to other colleges on a football scholarship but chose Black Mountain instead. Martin attended the college for five-and-a-half years, graduating in art with Marcel Breuer as his graduation examiner. In addition to courses in the general curriculum, he took art with Josef Albers, stage studies with Xanti Schawinsky, and drama with Robert Wunsch. After graduation, he taught art at John Burroughs School, a private high school in St. Louis, where he also coached winning teams in sports. During World War II he trained as a pilot. He was sent to Pearl Harbor soon after the bombing and then to the Fiji Islands and Guadalcanal for more training. He later flew fighter escort in Solomon Islands and trained on the S4FL-Hellcat. After the war Martin was a commercial pilot for thirty-five years until his retirement in 1976.

Maud, Ralph (December 24, 1928 – December 8, 2014)

Ralph Maud, Emeritus Professor of English and Associate Professor of the Institute for the Humanities at Simon Fraser University in British Columbia, Canada, was the founder and president of the Charles Olson Literary Society. Maud met Charles Olson at the State University of New York at Buffalo, and became close friends with the poet before his death in 1970. He is editor of much of the work of Dylan Thomas and has written and edited a number of books on Charles Olson including *Charles Olson's Reading: A Bibliography* (1996), *What Does Not Change: The Significance of Charles Olson's 'The Kingfishers', Charles Olson & Frances Bolderoff: A Modern Correspondence; The Selected Letters of Charles Olson; Poet to Publisher: Charles Olsons' Correspondence with Donald Allen; A Charles Olson* Reader, *Charles Olson and the Northwestern-Newberry Moby-Dick;* Charles *Olson at the Harbor;* and *Muthlogos: Lectures and Interviews* (2010), among others.

Mayer, Franziska (July 4, 1914–[April 9, 1995?])

Franziska Mayer taught weaving at Black Mountain College from the summer of 1946 through the summer of 1947 when Anni Albers was on sabbatical. Born in Hamburg, Germany, Mayer was the niece of Max Wilhelm Dehn, who taught mathematics at the college. In 1934, after the rise of Fascism in Germany, she fled to Stockholm where she studied weaving at Johanna Brunson's Weaving School and received her teacher's diploma. In 1938, she became weaving instructor and designer for the Industrial Department of the International Grenfell Association in Labrador. She was an occupational therapist during the war and assistant director for the Grenfell Orphanage. In 1945 she arrived in the United States and worked in workshops in New York. After she left Black Mountain, she visited Peru with a Martha Hult (Leiken), a former Black Mountain student. From 1954 through 1978, she ran a gallery and gift shop in Huancayo, Peru, which employed local weavers who made utilitarian objects and wall hangings incorporating traditional Peruvian motifs. In 1978, the workshop was taken over by a development market which continued to run it as a cooperative marketing organization.

McCleery, William (September 15, 1911-January 16, 2000)

William McCleery was resident writer for the 1939 spring semester at Black Mountain College. He wrote a play *Let Me Have Air* which was performed at the college. The songs including "Let Me Have Air," "I'm

a Fool for Freedom," and others became theme songs which were often performed at college singalongs and other occasions. McCleery was born in Hastings, Nebraska, and graduated from the University of Nebraska. He was a playwright and editor and was affiliated with Princeton University for many years. He had two plays on Broadway in the 1940s and was a reporter for The Associated Press, as well as an editor for *Life*, *PM* and *Ladies' Home Journal*. He wrote a dozen plays for television and was the author of *Wolf Story*, a children's book.

Minters, Arthur H. (July 22, 1932–April 2, 2014)

Arthur Minters was born in the Bronx, New York and grew up in Greenwich Village where his father, a Russian immigrant who owned a lithographic company, introduced him to books and art. In 1950 Minters enrolled at City College. In the summer of 1951, he was a student at Black Mountain College where he studied with Robert Motherwell. He also took photography classes with Harry Callahan and Aaron Siskind and a writing class with Charles Olson. Minters returned to New York and continued his art studies. He completed his B.A. degree in art history at New York University, while working for an antiquarian book business. In 1957, he started his own antiquarian book business which specialized in European 19th Century material in the arts, architecture, small press publications, photography, manifestos from the French Revolution, and ephemera. He lectured extensively on antiquarian books. He taught courses on collecting rare books and other printed material at the New School for Social Research and Marymount College. His business issued ninety antiquarian book catalogues. He is the author of *Collecting Books for Fun and Profit* (New York: Arco Publishers, 1979).

Moles, Clifford (July 26, 1919-March 13, 1980)

Moles, Shirley (May 22, 1918-February 26, 2006)

Clifford "Cliff" Moles was farm manager at Black Mountain College from the summer of 1946 through the summer of 1948. He shared the position with Ray Trayer and his family. When Moles joined the

faculty, the farmer was a staff position, but in the spring of 1947, the farmer was granted faculty status. Moles, his wife Shirley and their children Diane and Denis first lived in a cottage designed by Josef Albers, the first building constructed by the college at Lake Eden. Mac and Emily Woods had live there previously and thus it was referred to as the "Mac Woods" cottage. After Mary Gregory and students raised the roof on the farmhouse to accommodate two families, the Moles family shared the farmhouse with Ray Trayer and his family. During the war Moles was a conscientious objector. He worked at several sites including Iowa State Agricultural College and for two summers he was manager of an experimental farm in Northwestern Iowa for Iowa State College in Pennsylvania. Before coming to Black Mountain he and Shirley were house parents at an orphanage sponsored by the chocolate magnate Milton Hershey. After the Moles left Black Mountain, they returned to Shenandoah, Iowa where Cliff farmed as a tenant farmer for the remainder of his life.

Moore, Robert Seaborn (August 2, 1937-)

As a child, Robert "Rob" Moore visited Black Mountain College with his father who was an F.B.I. agent. In 1964, he curated the first known Black Mountain College exhibition after the college's closing. The exhibition, his M.F.A. thesis, was shown at the Carroll Reese Museum at East Tennessee State University and then at the Asheville Art Museum in North Carolina. The exhibition included works by about sixty artists, including Willem de Kooning, Robert Rauschenberg and Josef Albers. Moore held several positions: Director of the B. Carroll Reece Museum, art faculty at the University of South Carolina, and director of the Savannah Arts Council (and Gallery/Museum) where he helped develop a nationally accredited, annual competition for professional artists. He returned to New York where he painted. His work was exhibited in New York, Georgia and North Carolina. In 1967 he returned to Georgia as Artistin-Residence at the University of Georgia. He also taught at the University of Cincinnati. After his marriage to Linda Heisel, he taught for five years at Western North Carolina University. There he worked with Linda Schele on the nature of Mayan culture and civilization. From 1973-78, he lived on a farm in Dillon, South Carolina, where he continued his pre-Columbian studies and worked as a crop duster. Moore and his wife joined the Peace Corps in 1979. They served in Ecuador for two-and –a-half years. Influenced by Paulo Freire's Pedagogy of the Oppressed and under the tutelage of Cuban Richard Crespo, Moore and his wife dedicated themselves to "non-formal education as the primary tool to enable marginalized communities to take control of their lives." Moore worked with MAP International for three years and was then world-wide director. From 1987-94, he worked in South and Central America developing a program to train local teachers to be non-formal educators. While working on his Doctorate of Ministry degree with the Columbia Seminary in Decatur, Georgia, Moore served as a Presbyterian social-justice coordinator in Guatemala. Moore retired in 2003 and spent a year in an Anglican Benedictine Monastery. After the death of his wife, he returned to Ajijic, Mexico where he painted and wrote poetry and short fiction. In 2014 he moved with his second wife Bonnie Ann Kleffel to Asheville, North Carolina where he continues to write.

Nacke, Marian June (February 3, 1919-)

Nacke, Frank (July 20, 1920- August 13, 1940)

Frank Nacke (July 20, 1920-August 13, 1940) grew up in Denver, Colorado where his father, a German immigrant, worked as an upholsterer. He was also a fine craftsman and taught his son woodworking in his furniture shop. Frank followed his older sister Marian Nacke (Teeter) to Black Mountain College in the fall of 1938 and was a student there until his death in 1940. He took courses in political science, literature, history, and music. He also worked in the print shop and played basketball, tennis and other sports.

At the end of the first year, Nacke returned to Denver to be with his father in his final illness. After his father's death he spent the summer at Harvard summer school and sang with the Harvard Choral Society. He was Student Moderator and thus a member of the governing Board of Fellows in the year that the college had to make a decision about the move to the Lake Eden campus. He also was a student teacher. Nacke remained at Black Mountain for the 1940 summer to work at the Lake Eden Inn, a summer resort operated by the faculty and students on the college property while the college was still located in the Blue Ridge buildings. On August 13, 1940, Nacke and Morton Steinau attempted to open the flood gates of the Lake Eden dam in a heavy rain. The boat capsized and both were washed over the dam. Steinau managed to reach land but Nacke did not. His body was found the following morning.

Frank Nacke's sister, Marian, was a student at Black Mountain College from 1936 to 1940. She came to the college after reading the *Reader's Digest* condensed version of Louis Adamic's article about the school and its philosophy. Teeter was interested in literature and music and took classes with Fred Mangold, John Evarts, John Rice, and Robert Wunsch. During her second year at Black Mountain, Teeter eloped with a student, an episode which lasted only briefly. John Rice arranged for her return to the college. She passed the Senior Division exam and planned to graduate in music. She later obtained her B.A. and M.A. degrees in school psychology.

Nakagawa, Masato (June 2, 1918-May 25, 1983)

Masato Nakagawa was a student at Black Mountain College in the summer of 1949. He was one of a group of students from the Institute of Design who were studying under Buckminster Fuller. They were dubbed by the Black Mountain students Fuller's "Twelve Disciples." Some were later to form the core of those involved in the further development of geodesic domes. During the summer of 1949, Fuller and the students continued work on the Autonomous Dwelling Facility with a Geodesic Structure which Fuller and the students had designed at the Institute of Design the previous winter. The students involved in the experiments included Nakagawa, Louis Caviani, Arthur Boericke, Eugene Godfrey, Mary Jo Slick Godfrey, Joseph Manulik, Alan Lindsay, Jeffrey Lindsay, Ysidore Martinez, Donald Richter, Robert Richter, and Harold Young, among others. At Black Mountain College, Nakagawa photographed the campus, students, teachers, and construction of the dome. Nakagawa was a graphic designer. He was one of three designers selected by Herbert Bayer to work with him on the design of the *World Geographic Atlas: A Composite of Man's Environment* (1953), commissioned by the Container Corporation in celebration of its 25th anniversary. The book design was a five-year project.

Noland, Harry Casewell (May 8, 1927-December 17, 2002)

Harry Noland was the one of three Noland brothers – Harry, Kenneth and Neil – to attend Black Mountain College. He was a student from 1946-1948, including the 1947 and 1948 summer sessions. His wife Christa was nurse and his daughter Ann was born at the college. At the college Noland took a general curriculum with a focus on chemistry. Noland had served in the army during the war, and after he left Black Mountain he reenlisted and was stationed primarily in Germany. After he retired from the military, he taught photography at the Hampton Institute in Virginia. In Asheville, after graduation from high school in 1935, Noland had taught himself photography, photographing summer camps in the Asheville area and working in Palm Beach winters.

Oates, Jr., Andrew Francis (January 23, 1926-June 29, 2012)

Andrew "Andy" Oates was raised in Graniteville, Rhode Island. He served in the Pacific Theater in the Navy during World War II and later graduated from the Rhode Island School of Design. He was Black Mountain College's first graduate in photography in May 1951. His examiner was Edward Steichen. Oates took classes under Hazel Archer, who in 1949-50 produced with her students a photographic publicity "viewbook" and a photography journal, *Five Photographers*, which was printed and bound at the college. The journal, which appeared only once, contained statements and individually printed photographs by Oates and other students. He also studied weaving with Anni Albers, Trude Guermonprez, Marli Ehrmann, and Ellen Siegel. He worked in both photography and weaving and was the co-founder of Nantucket Looms. His photographs are in the permanent collection of the Artists Association of Nantucket.

Page, Don (September 14, 1917-June 4, 2007)

Charles Donald "Don" Page was born in Denver, Colorado. He attended Black Mountain College from the fall of 1936 through the fall of 1940. In the spring of 1941 when Anni Albers was on sabbatical, he was apprentice teacher in weaving. He attended the 1941 and 1942 summer work camps. His focus was on the arts with classes under Lawrence Kocher and Howard Dearstyne in architecture, art with Josef Albers and weaving with Anni Albers. He also took a general curriculum. He graduated with Christopher Tunnard of Harvard as his examiner. In 1942, he joined the Air Force as an intelligence officer and was stationed in China and Burma. In 1946, he enrolled in the Harvard Graduate School of Design where he received his master's degree in architecture in 1948. There he studied under architects Walter Gropius and Marcel Breuer. For a decade, he was an associate with the I.M. Pei & Partners architectural firm of New York City, where he was head of the graphics department. He remained with the firm until 1966 when he formed Page, Arbitrio & Resen, Ltd, a graphics firm. He also designed modern houses, integrating outdoors with indoors, in upstate New York and on Long Island and Martha's Vineyard. Page received awards from the American Institute of Graphic Arts and the Museum of Modern Art, among many others. His work was published in Progressive Architecture, Better Homes and Gardens, The New York Times Magazine, Industrial Design, Interiors, the Arts of Black Mountain College and Bauhaus Textiles.

Parker, Mary Althea (November 20, 1906-December 9, 2003)

Mary "Polly" Parker was born in Oxford, North Carolina. She spent much of her childhood in Cuba where her father was a Methodist minister. She also lived in Asheville, North Carolina; El Paso, Texas; and Memphis, Tennessee. She attended Southwestern College of the Mississippi Valley (Rhodes College). After graduation she attended Methodist College in Memphis for her nursing degree. She then was sent to Highland Hospital in Asheville for psychiatric training. She befriended a patient who then took her on several trips to Europe and introduced her to the world of music and art. While she was at Highland Hospital –circa 1931 to 1942, she visited the college as frequently as possible for concerts and other events. She later settled in London, New Hampshire where she was a nurse for over thirty years. She started the art department at Brevard Transylvania Music Camp (Brevard Music Center) and taught at Colby Junior College. After her retirement she returned to the Asheville area to live at Highland Farms

Perrow, Charles Bryce (February 9, 1925-)

Charles "Chick" Perrow was born in Tacoma, Washington in 1925. Perrow came to Black Mountain College after reading an article about the experimental school in *Reader's Digest* while he was serving in the army in Japan. He was a student at Black Mountain College from 1946 to 1948 and the 1948 summer session. He received his Ph.D. in sociology from the University of California-Berkeley in 1960 and became a noted organizational theorist and sociologist. He has held appointments at the universities of Michigan, Pittsburgh, Wisconsin, SUNY Stony Brook, and Yale, where he became emeritus in 2000. Since 2004 he has been a visiting professor at the Center for International Security and Cooperation at Stanford, in the winter and spring quarters. Perrow is the author of *Complex Organizations: A Critical Essay,* first published in 1972, 3rd edition, 1986 (McGraw Hill), *Normal Accidents: Living With High Risk Technologies* (1984, rev. ed. 1999, Princeton), *The Next Catastrophe: Reducing Our Vulnerabilities to Natural, Industrial, and Terrorist Disasters* (2007, rev. ed. 2011); *The AIDS Disaster: The Failure of Organizations in New York and the Nation* (1990, Yale, with Mauro F. Guillén); *The Radical Attack on Business* (1972, Harcourt Brace Jovanovich); *Organizational Analysis: A Sociological View* (1970, Tavistock Press); and *Organization for Treatment: A Comparative Study of Juvenile Correctional Institutions* (1966, The Free Press, with David Street and Robert D. Vinter).

Pollet, Elizabeth (June 27, 1922 - February 22, 2012)

Elizabeth Pollet attended Black Mountain College from 1938 to 1939. She was one of a number of students who were attracted to the college by Louis Adamic's article in *Harper's*. Both her father Joseph Pollet and her stepfather Ralph Scarlett were artists. She took art with Albers although she did not care for his method of teaching. She also took writing with John Rice and took part in plays. Although she

liked Black Mountain, she wanted to study at a university with a more intellectual structure. After a year she left to attend the University of Chicago. Her early novel *A Family Romance* (1950) was successful. She was a poet, a translator and an editor. A brief early marriage ended in divorce as did her second marriage to Delmore Schwartz, a brilliant but disturbed poet and short story writer, whose use of alcohol and drugs resulted in his death in 1966. She edited his writings as *Portrait of Delmore, Journals and Notes of Delmore Schwartz 1939-1959* (1986). She was a longtime companion of Robert Sunley, a Black Mountain College student.

Raymond, Harold B. (November 3, 1919 – December 13, 2008)

Harold B. Raymond was a student at Black Mountain College from 1938 to 1942, specializing in history. He was Student Moderator for one year and a member of the Board of Fellows. He also provided unskilled labor for the Studies Building construction – nailing floorboards, pouring concrete, digging the drainage ditch. Three weeks after graduation, Raymond was inducted into the U.S. Army. He served as a radio operator in the Pacific and in the United States. In 1951 he married and had a son. In 1952 he obtained his PhD in English history from Harvard University. He taught at the University of Delaware (1948-51) and then for forty-two years at Colby College in Maine. He retired Professor Emeritus in 1994.

Resnik, David (April 17, 1921-)

Resnik, Elizabeth Cowles Gellhorn (February 22, 1927-July 26, 2008)

David "Dave" Resnik spent his early childhood in Liverpool, England and moved to the U.S. when he was ten. When World War II broke out, he served in an engineering battalion, seeing combat in Italy and France. After the war, he entered Black Mountain College where he was chairman of the Black

Mountain College Chapter of the Southern Negro Youth Congress. While at Black Mountain College, he married fellow student Elizabeth "Liz" Cowles Gellhorn in 1947 and they subsequently had four children. They were married for sixty years. Following Black Mountain College, he earned his B.A. in social work from the New School for Social Research in New York City and his master's degree from the University of Connecticut, School of Social Work. The Resniks settled in Stockbridge, Massachusetts where David worked for the Berkshire Farm for Boys and Elizabeth was active in the community. In 1963 he was named Director of the social services department at the school. David Resnik is author of *War Days, Melancholy Lessons Towards Living* (2002) and *Selected Poems, 1997-1998* (1999). Elizabeth worked for many years at the Stockbridge Library. She died in 2008.

Rice, Frank Aydelotte (April 1, 1917 – October 7, 2007)

Frank Aydelotte Rice, son of John Rice, founder of the college, arrived at Black Mountain College with his family in 1933. He was a student there from 1934 to 1937. Born in Chicago, Rice grew up in Lincoln, Nebraska; Winter Park, Florida, and London. He earned his B.A. from the University of North Carolina in 1938 and his A.B.L.S. (library science) degree from the University of Michigan in 1943. He also did graduate study in linguistics there and at Columbia University. In 1938-40 Rice taught German to refugees while working with the American Friends Service Committee in Cuba. He also taught German at the College of Charleston in South Carolina for a year (1946-47). He joined the faculty at Black Mountain to teach German in the fall of 1947 and remained for two years. Besides teaching German, Rice was the music librarian, and helped in the print shop.

During the 1950s, Rice taught Arabic to employees of the Arabian American Oil Co. (Aramco) in Saudi Arabia. With Majid Sa'id, he co-authored *Eastern Arabic* (Georgetown University Press, 1956) He also is author of *The Classical Arabic Writing System* (Harvard University Press, 1959). Until his retirement in 1971, he worked for the Center for Applied Linguistics in Washington, DC. In 1940 Rice married Ann Craig Sutton in Haverfold, Pennsylvania. They had three children, John Andrew Rice III, Frances Sutton Rice and William Craig Rice. Rice died in Falls Church, Virginia in 2007.

Richards, Mary Caroline

(July 13, 1916 – September 10, 1999)

Mary Caroline "M.C." Richards was hired by Black Mountain College in the fall of 1945 to teach literature and writing. She remained at the college through the summer of 1952 except for the summer of 1946, a sabbatical from the fall of 1948 through the 1949 summer session, and the 1952 spring semester.

Richards' husband Albert William Levi, whom she married in 1945, taught philosophy and social sciences.

Richards was born in Weiser, Idaho in 1916 and grew up in Portland, Oregon. She received a B.A. degree in literature and languages from Reed College in 1937 and a Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley. The catalyst for Richards' application to Black Mountain was disenchantment with traditional academic teaching methods. A popular teacher at Black Mountain, she began to write poetry, was active in theater and dance, and studied pottery with Robert Turner. She translated and participated in plays by Cocteau, Satie and Yeats, among others. Levi left the college in 1951, after his separation from Richards. In the December 1951, Richards traveled with David Tudor and Katherine Litz on a dance tour. This was the beginning of a long liaison with Tudor. She was granted a leave-of-absence for the 1952 spring term and resigned at the end of the summer session. She remained in close touch with the college until its closing.

In 1954, Richards was a founding member of the Gatehill Cooperative Community ("The Land") with David Tudor, John Cage, Karen Karnes, David Weinrib and Paul and Vera Williams near Stony Point, N.Y. Richards lived there for a decade, working in a studio with Karnes where they developed a form of flame-proof clay to make ceramic cookware. In 1984 Richards became a resident co-worker at Camphill Village in Kimberton Hills, Pennsylvania, a community for adults with special needs. She maintained a studio at Camphill and worked in ceramics until her death there in September 1999. A retrospective of her work was held at the Worcester Center for Crafts in Massachusetts in October 1999.

Richards printed and bound her first book *Poems* at Black Mountain in December 1947. She is also author of the influential *Centering in Pottery, Poetry and the Person* (1964), *The Crossing Point* (1973), *Toward Wholeness: Rudolph Steiner Education in America* (1980), *Imagine Inventing Yellow* (1991), and *Opening Our Moral Eye* (1996),

Richter, Donald Louis (April 2, 1927-)

Donald Louis "Don" Richter attended Black Mountain College in the summer of 1949, as one of Buckminster Fuller's "Twelve Disciples", a group of students who had studied with Fuller the previous year at the Institute of Design in Chicago. At Black Mountain the students re-erected a dome designed and constructed the previous year and created a plastic cover for the dome. Richter returned with Fuller to Chicago at the end of the summer session. He received B.A. from the Institute of Design in Chicago, focusing on manufacturing design and structural engineering. He designed the Kaiser Aluminum Geodesic Dome, the first of which as erected in Hawaii. He was co-founded Temcor, which designed, manufactured and erect thousands of geodesic domes and related space structures internationally. He published papers and articles, and has obtained numerous United States and International patents.

Rittenhouse, Martha Alvaretta (February 6, 1929-)

Martha Alvaretta Rittenhouse Treichler, born in Easton, Maryland, attended Bridgewater College in Virginia for two years before applying to Black Mountain College in 1948. While at Black Mountain, she studied literature with Edward Dahlberg and Charles Olson, art with Josef Albers and linguistics with Frank Rice. In April 1950, she married William "Bill" Treichler, who was also a student at the college. They moved to the Treichler family farm in Troy Mills, Iowa where they reared their five children. At the family farm, they sought to put into practice principles of organic farming and rural self-sufficiency. After fifteen years on the Iowa farm, the Treichlers moved first to Colorado and then Vermont where

both worked as teachers. Martha obtained her B.A. degree from Goddard and her M.A. from Dartmouth. In 1971 the family moved to a farm near Hammondsport, New York where Martha became food director at Ira Davenport Hospital. For twenty years she worked as a consultant dietitian at area hospitals and nursing homes. Her poems and short stories have been published as *Black Mountain to Crooked Lake: Poems 1948-2010, with a Memoir of Black Mountain College* (2010), *Living on a Dirt Road* (2011) and *Variations on a Theme* (2014). She and her husband started *The Crooked Lake Review,* a local history magazine for the Finger Lakes and Lake Ontario region of New York. Bill Treichler died in 2008.

Robertson, Ronald George (September 25, 1927-)

Ronald Robertson enrolled at Black Mountain College for the1951 summer and fall terms. There he studied painting and drawing with Ben Shahn and Robert Motherwell. Born in 1927 in Detroit, Michigan, Robertson was one of a number of students from the Cass Technical High School to enroll at Black Mountain. After high school graduation and service in the military, he spent a year in Europe and enrolled at Wayne State University. He returned to Wayne State after Black Mountain to complete his B.S. degree in art education. He then studied art and calligraphy in Japan for ten years. While there he taught art and directed an arts and crafts program. He exhibited prints at the Yoseido Gallery in Tokyo and wrote articles for the *The East-West Journal*. He also wrote a book *Contemporary Printmaking in Japan* (1965). He returned to the United States to accept a position at the University of California / Santa Barbara. Robertson has exhibited his assemblages, paintings, prints, and calligraphy at numerous one-man and group shows. He also worked as a commercial abalone diver in Santa Barbara, California.

Schauffler, Verna Raattama (August 20, 1924-)

Manvel "Schauff" Schauffler was born in New York City in 1924, and grew up in New Rochelle, New York. He attended Williams College for a few years before joining the U.S. Navy in 1943, where he served on an LST in the Mediterranean. He attended Black Mountain College from the fall of 1946 through the spring of 1948, including the 1948 summer session. There he met Verna Raattama from New York Mills, Minnesota. They were married from 1947 until his death in 2013. In 1947 the Schaufflers and several others from Black Mountain College decided to form a group with the goal of cooperative living, farming, and becoming a part of a small town where they could make a contribution. The town they chose was Estacada, Oregon, where the group lived together on a farm. Schauffler taught at Estacada High School and led a Boy Scout troop, while earning his B.A. and M.A. at Lewis & Clark College. In 1951 Schauffler began working as a teacher at Catlin Gabel School, a progressive experiential private school in Portland, Oregon. He served as headmaster for thirteen years where he followed the philosophy that students are at the center of education and their voices should be heard. He de-emphasized grades and made the student body president an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees. In 1980 the Schaufflers moved to Seattle where he taught middle school at the Bush School and founded the Zushi Kaisei summer program for students from Japan. While in Seattle, he help found two private schools, Hyla Middle School and Explorer West. Schauffler was involved with peace and justice issues through the American Friends Service Committee and led student groups to England and Germany with the Experiment in International Living.

BOX 17 Schindler-Snelson

Schindler, Mark (July 20, 1922 - January 6, 2012)

Mark Schindler was a student at Black Mountain College from 1940 to 1942 studying physics and mathematics with Peter Bergmann and Nathan Rosen. He graduated from Reed College and earned a master's degree in physics from the University of Southern California. As an electronics engineer, he contributed to U.S. spacecraft projects including the Redstone Project and the Shuttle program. He also worked for ITT, Christie Electric, and Skurka Engineering. Schindler was the son of noted modern architect Rudolf Schindler, a colleague of Frank Lloyd Wright, who designed numerous houses in Los Angeles including the 1922 "Kings Road" house in West Hollywood where Mark Schindler was born and grew up. The Kings Road house was a center for avant-garde art and inquiry, where musicians, poets, and artists regularly gathered. The house is now a museum and is open to the public. Schindler was married to Mary DuPont. They had three children but were later divorced.

Schlein, Eva (May 14, 1923-June 25, 2002)

Eva Schlein Jungermann, born in Furth (Bavaria) Germany in 1923, was one of a number of refugee students at Black Mountain. She was enrolled at the college for the 1945 spring quarter, the 1945-46 academic year and the 1946 fall session. She also attended the 1945 summer session. Her primary interests were writing, philosophy, psychology, and history. She received her M.A. from the University of Iowa. Jungermann was a writer, editor, interviewer and art critic, with two books *Primary Perceptions* and *Poets at Play*. She was active in arts organizations in Phoenix and Scottsdale including the Phoenix Art Museum, the Scottsdale Center for the Arts and the Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art, the National Academy of Arts and Letters, and the Phoenix Bach Choir. She contributed to many journals and encouraged young artists. She was a founder and managing editor of *Focus on Art*, a contemporary art and poetry journal.

Schmitt, Elaine (March 19, 1925-October 17, 2004)

As a child Elaine Schmitt (Urbain), who was born in 1925 in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, was frequently at Conrad Schmitt Stained Glass Studios, founded by her grandfather in 1885 in Milwaukee. Urbain, along with her siblings, helped in the Studios and was exposed to art at an early age. She heard about Black Mountain College from her sister Elizabeth Schmiit Jennerjahn and other students from Milwaukee State Teachers' College who attended in the summer of 1944. She enrolled for the 1945 Summer Art Institute and remained through the summer of 1946 when she moved to New York. At Black Mountain she studied art with Josef Albers, Lyonel Feininger and Robert Motherwell, among others. She met her future husband, John Urbain, at the college. Besides her sister, who also taught dance at the college, her two brothers, Conrad and Rupert, also attended Black Mountain College. Schmitt was an internationally known artist who exhibited in the U.S., France, and Spain. She was also a devoted advocate for social justice. In 1963, Elaine traveled to Rome with the Women for Peace Pilgrimage. While there she made a drawing of Pope John III. In 1971, she attended the Paris Peace Conference. She also drew several portraits of leading peace activists including: Norman Thomas, Linus Pauling, Daniel Berrigan and Dorothy Day. Her work is held in museums and galleries in the U.S.

Seidler, Harry (June 26, 1923 – March 9, 2006)

Harry Seidler was born in Vienna, Austria in 1923. He fled to England as a teenager after the Nazis occupied Austria in 1938. There he studied building and construction at Cambridgeshire Technical School. In May 1940, he was interned by the British authorities as an enemy alien, before being shipped to Quebec, Canada. In October 1941, he was released to study architecture at the University of Manitoba. He attended Harvard Graduate School of Design under Walter Gropius and Marcel Breuer on a scholarship in 1945/46. During that period he did work with Alvar Aalto in Boston drawing up plans for the Baker dormitory at MIT. In 1946 he enrolled at the Black Mountain 1946 Summer Art Institute, studying with art with Josef Albers and woodworking with Mary Gregory. In New York he worked for Marcel Breuer in New York and became a leading proponent of the Bauhaus principles of design in his architectural practice. When Seidler's parents migrated to Australia, they commissioned him to design their home which became known as the Rose Seidler House in Wahroonag, a Sydney suburb (1948–1950). The house was the first domestic residence to fully express the philosophy of the Bauhaus in Australia. Seidler married Penelope Evatt in 1958 and they had two children. Seidler designed more

than 180 buildings, many of which are located in Australia. He won numerous awards for his architectural work and was made a Companion of the Order of Australia in 1987.

Sihvonen, Miriam (July 31, 1919 -)

Miriam "Mim" Sihvonen was the oldest of four children, three of whom attended Black Mountain College. She was the second to enroll. Her brother Oli, the first to enroll, was a painter and her sister Eine, a weaver. Both parents were first-generation immigrants from Finland. After graduation from high school in 1937, Sihvonen attended nursing school in Hartford, Connecticut. During the war she enlisted in the army and served for three years as a registered nurse. She first served at airfields in the United States and then was stationed in Paris and near Reims with the 198th General Hospital. She enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1947 spring semester and remained there through the 1948-49 academic year. At the college Sihvonen helped Mary Gregory raise the farm house roof to accommodate two families and worked independently on other woodworking projects. She made several frames for Josef Albers and delicate bowls on the lathe. She also took a general curriculum including a course in Proust with M.C. Richards, Geometry for Artists with Max Dehn, and music appreciation with Charlotte Schlesinger. She took charge of the Work Program, scheduling the various assignments. After Black Mountain Sihvonen opened a woodworking shop. She later returned to nursing, working as an operating room nurse at Prince Georges Hospital and later a mental health nurse for disturbed children at the National Institutes of Health. In 1960, she received a B.A. degree from American University in Nursing Education. Before retiring she worked on several research projects, including an experimental project on animals at Walter Reed Hospital, a study of tropical diseases in Ghana, Africa

Simon, Morris Leon (March 21, 1918-July 16, 2001)

Morris "Mouse" Simon was a student at Black Mountain College from 1940-1941. He grew up in Union City, New Jersey where his father had a haberdashery. He took a general curriculum including mathematics, political theory, drama, literature and art. Through Black Mountain friends in New York, he met Jeanne Cormany (Simon) (June 9, 1923- August 6, 1980), a Black Mountain student for 1944-45, who became his wife. He studied at the University of New Mexico and did his graduate work at Cornell University. In 1954 he joined the faculty at the University of Vermont in Burlington where he taught political science until his retirement. Jean was a specialist in child development and taught at the University of Vermont as an adjunct member of the faculty. She lectured extensively and was wellknown in her field. Both of the Simons pursued art as an avocation. Simon created wood sculptures out of found material.

Singer, Jacqueline (March 26, 1930-)

Jacqueline Singer Penney, artist, author, teacher and lecturer, was a student at Black Mountain College for the 1949 Summer Institute. She studied at the Phoenix School of Design in New York and at the Institute of Design in Chicago as well as with individual artists. She has taught and painted in the village of Cutchogue on the North Fork of Long Island. She is best known for her realistic pastoral scenes and seascapes. She has written three books on art technique: *Painting Greeting Cards in Watercolor*, *Discover the Joy of Acrylic Painting*, and *Painting Seaside Scenes in Acrylics* and a memoir, *Me Painting Me: A Memoir.* Her award winning paintings include a self-portrait entitled, "Me," that is in the National Association of Women Artist's permanent collection housed at the Zimmerli Art Museum.

Sly, Allan Bernard (July 25, 1907- December 31, 1990)

Allan Bernard Sly, pianist and composer, taught music at Black Mountain from 1935-39. He was born in England and educated at the University of Reading, the Royal Academy of Music in London, and the Concord Summer School of Music in Massachusetts. He studied piano with Evlyn Howard-Jones and composition with Gustav Holst and Benjamin Dale. In 1926 his composition *Holiday Tune* was performed by Sir Adrian Boult at the Royal College of Music in London. He taught at Toronto Conservatory of Music, as well as private schools in England, Canada and the United States. He composed some of his most important works during his time at the college, including his Symphony (1935-36) which was rehearsed by the newly formed North Carolina Symphony. His wife Elizabeth Ware Sly (May 7, 1913-May 7, 1993) tutored in music and performed in college concerts. In 1939 Sly resigned from Black Mountain College to accept a position at the College of William and Mary. He moved to Quincy, Massachusetts in 1950 after teaching at McGill University in Montreal, where he composed songs and a symphony. At his death, he was the organist and choirmaster of All Saints Church in Dorchester, Massachusetts.

Smith, Nancy (February 18, 1923-)

Nancy Smith Wright, a native of Wisconsin, enrolled at Black Mountain College for the 1944 Summer Art Institute. She remained for the 1944-45 fall and winter terms and the1945 Summer Art Institute. She was one of a number of students from Milwaukee State Teachers College to attend the college. She married Ernest Wright (October 27, 1920-December 5, 2009), an architect who worked for The Architects Collaborative. Nancy Wright was a homemaker for her four daughters and her husband. Has pursued weaving as an avocation.

Snelson, Kenneth (June 19, 1927-)

Kenneth Snelson, a contemporary sculptor and photographer, grew up in Pendleton, Oregon where his father John Tavner Snelson had a camera shop. After Snelson's discharge from the U.S. Navy, he enrolled at the University of Oregon in Eugene to study painting. Snelson was particularly interested in Josef Albers, Lyonel Feininger, Wassily Kandinsky and Paul Klee, and when he discovered that Albers, a former Bauhaus instructor, was teaching at Black Mountain College, he decided to apply for admission to the summer session. The faculty for that session included Josef Albers, Anni Albers, Willem de Kooning, John Cage, Merce Cunningham, Buckminster Fuller, and Richard Lippold. At the end of the summer, Snelson enrolled for the fall term to study mathematics with Max Dehn and physics with Natasha Goldowski, but he soon found the regular term to be slower than the summer and he returned to Oregon. Snelson began working with wire sculpture that consisted of stacked elements that moved on swivel points. He achieved a major breakthrough with a work he titled "Early X Piece" (1948), in which two wooden X-forms were held together without touching by a matrix of nylon tension lines. Snelson returned to BMC's summer session in 1949. Snelson later attended the Chicago Institute of Design and studied with Fernand Léger in Paris, France.

Snelson's sculpture and photography, which fuse engineering and science with art, have been exhibited at over twenty-five one-man shows in galleries around the world. His work is in major collections. Snelson is the recipient of many awards including New York State Council on the Arts Sculpture (1971); DAAD Fellowship for Berlin Kunstlerprogram (1976); Honorary Doctorate, Arts and Humane Letters Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, New York (1985); American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, Art Award (1987); Award, Prix Ars Electronia, Linz, Austria (1989); and Membership, American Academy of Arts & Letters (1994). Snelson lives and works in New York, New York.

BOX 18 Spayth-Stone

Spayth, Sue June (June 20, 1920 – May 25, 2006)

Sue June Spayth Wolpert Riley was born in 1920 in Houston, TX. Her father was a newspaper cartoonist, editor, and publisher. Her mother was also a journalist. Spayth attended Black Mountain College from 1937 to 1940 where she majored in drama and performed as Lady Macbeth. While at BMC, she met her first husband, Jeremiah F. Wolpert (May 21, 1920-July 25, 1949), with whom she had two sons, Thomas and Jeremiah. Wolpert died of polio in 1949.

During World War II, Sue Riley was a reporter for the daily newspaper in Hays, Kansas, and then worked for Time Inc. in New York City. She later worked as a reporter and columnist for her father's newspaper in Dunellen, New Jersey. She completed her undergraduate degree in 1971 at Goddard College in Vermont and obtained a master's degree in early childhood education from the University of North Carolina / Charlotte.

Spayth was an innovative early childhood educator and author. She also was a long-time civil rights advocate who pushed to desegregate various public facilities in Charlotte, North Carolina She founded the city's first integrated preschool, the Open Door School at the Unitarian Church of Charlotte. She also taught at Central Piedmont Community College and authored the book *How to Generate Values in Young Children*.

Riley had a son, Michael George, by her second husband Jesse Louis Riley and two stepchildren, Clodagh Feeney Watson Riley and Peter Riley.

Sprague, Victor (November 16, 1908-August 31, 2001)

Victor Sprague, a marine biologist and authority marine invertebrates and their parasites, taught biology at Black Mountain from the fall of 1951 through the fall of 1952. Spague obtained his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois and taught at several schools including Louisiana State University and Young Harris College. He served in the army during World War II. Before arriving at Black Mountain, he was head of the Parasitology Division, Project 9 at the Texas A&M Research Foundation.

Steinau, Morton Jerome (February 14, 1917-May 16, 2004)

Steinau, Barbara Leigh Hill (March 24, 1920-December 2, 2013) Barbara Hill Steinau (then Barbara Hill) graduated from high school in Laguna Beach, California in 1937. She enrolled in Black Mountain College where she was a student through March 1942. She took a general curriculum including art, music, literature, John Rice's Plato class, sociology, biology, drama, psychology, and anthropology. She passed the Senior Division examination and considered studying linguistics. When informed that she was ill-prepared, having never studied Latin, she chose instead to major in psychology. For her work program assignment, Steinau worked in the college store, helped with the Studies Building construction, and worked on the farm. In the summer of 1939 she married Morton Steinau, a student who had graduated and been appointed business manager for the college. In January 1943, they moved to Philadelphia where Morton Steinau worked as traffic manager in the production department of *Time/Life*. They then moved to East River Farm, a commune, in Guilford, Connecticut. Barbara began a career in early childhood education that included teaching and directing the Gesell Institute Nursery, founded by Arnold Gesell. She is the author of *Raising Peaceable Powerful Children*. The Steinaus had three children, the oldest of whom was born at Black Mountain.

Morton Steinau graduated from Louisville Male High School in Kentucky in January 1935. He and Bela Martin, another graduate, hitchhiked in bitter April weather from Louisville to Black Mountain College where their former teacher, Robert Wunsch, was teaching English. Steinau enrolled for the spring semester of 1935 and graduated in English literature in 1939. At Black Mountain Steinau took a general curriculum: John Rice's Plato and Greek classes, chemistry, ethics, literature, dramatics, philosophy, dance, music, and writing. His primary study was literature with Joseph Martin, his graduation advisor. From 1939 through 1943 he was business manager at the college. After Morton left *Time/Life*, the Steinaus moved to Connecticut where he had a handmade furniture business, hoping to support his family. After two years, he entered the life insurance business. He retired in 1978.

In 1990 the Steinaus moved to Cape Cod where they were active in Cape Codders for Peaceful Solutions. Morton Steinau was a founder of Cape Codders for Peace and Justice and was active in Fellowship for Reconciliation, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, and Cape Codders Against Racism.

Stepner, Bacia (July 3, 1925 - September 19, 2009)

Bacia Stepner Edelman was born in Boston, Massachusetts and attended Black Mountain College in the summer of 1946, studying design under Josef Albers and sculpture under Concetta Scarvaglione and Leo Amino. She completed her Bachelors of Fine Arts at Rhode Island School of Design in 1947 and completed her Masters of Fine Arts at New York State College of Ceramics, Alfred University in 1950. She

also studied in Vienna at the Akademie für Angwandte Kunst. She is renowned for her signature teapots and lichen glaze.

Stepner began working in clay before the age of five. Her aunt, who worked at the Paul Revere pottery in Boston, would bring her to Saturday night get-togethers at the pottery when all single female employees were allowed to bring their nieces and nephews. Stepner fell in love with clay, a passion that she exhibited until her death. Her aunt also ensured that Stepner took art classes at the Boston Museum during her childhood.

Following her marriage to University of Wisconsin political science professor Murray Edleman, she had three daughters. Her works have appeared in numerous juried and invitational exhibitions and are held in permanent, private and corporate collections.

Stix, John Morris (November 14, 1920 –October 2, 2004)

John Stix attended Black Mountain College from 1938 to 1942, graduating in music under Heinrich Jalowetz. Initially Stix was interested in theater and took part in many productions. Increasingly, however, he was drawn to the music program and the teaching of Heinrich Jalowetz and John Evarts. During World War II Stix served in the Signal Corps in the United Kingdom, France and Germany. After the war he spent a year in New York where he worked on a movie and then attended Yale University for his M.F.A. degree in drama. Subsequently he directed off-Broadway plays and the Broadway revival of Arthur Miller's *The Price*. From 1970 to 1973, Stix was Artistic Director of the Baltimore Center Stage. He also directed for television and film. Stix was one of the first directing members of the Actors Studio and worked with Lee Strasberg on the organization of the Lee Strasberg Theatre Institute. From 1973 to his death in 2004, Stix taught drama at The Juilliard School. In addition, Stix was a faculty member at the Circle in the Square Theatre School in New York City. Among his students are well-known actors such as Laura Linney, Anthony Mackie, Bradley Whitford and Kevin Spacey.

Stoller, Claude (December 2, 1921-)

Claude Stoller was a student at Black Mountain College from 1939 to 1943. He was born in the Bronx, New York where he attended public schools. He enrolled at City College of New York for a semester while searching for a school with a strong visual arts curriculum. Although he had heard of Black Mountain College from his brother Ezra Stoller, an architectural photographer, it was at the 1938 Bauhaus exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art in New York that Black Mountain caught his attention. At Black Mountain Stoller took a general curriculum with a focus on art and architecture. He took Josef Albers's basic courses in design, color and drawing and architectural courses with Lawrence Kocher, Howard Dearstyne, and Lou Bernard Voigt. Stoller was put in charge of the construction of the Jalowetz House, a small house designed by Lawrence Kocher for the Heinrich and Johanna Jalowetz.

Stoller left Black Mountain after the 1942 fall quarter when he was drafted into the United States Army. During World War II he first was in the 14th Coast Artillery on Puget Sound. He then attended army engineering school after which he was sent overseas with the 13th Armored Division in France and Germany. In February 1946, Stoller entered Harvard Graduate School of Design where he was accepted with advanced standing despite the fact he had not graduated from Black Mountain. After graduation in 1949 (M. Arch.), Stoller studied for a year at the University of Florence in Italy. He and his wife Nan Oldenburg Stoller (now Nan Black), a Black Mountain student and a graduate of Radcliffe, were joined by Lucian and Jane Slater Marquis, both Black Mountain students. On his return Stoller worked for architectural firms in the Boston area. In 1955 he moved his family to St. Louis, Missouri, where he taught at Washington University. While there, he was registered as an architect in both Missouri and Iowa.

In 1956 Stoller moved to the San Francisco area, where he formed a partnership, Marquis & Stoller Architects, with another young architect, Robert B. Marquis. The firm, with its office on Beach Street, focused on the general practice of architecture and planning including residential, housing, institutional, and governmental projects. In 1978 Stoller formed Stoller/Partners (later Stoller Knoerr Architects) in Berkeley. Projects included single homes, multiple dwellings, religious buildings, and institutional and commercial structures. Social issues such as housing and energy-efficient designs were a primary concern for Stoller as was historic preservation. In 1957 Stoller joined the faculty in the Department of Architecture at the University of California. He was acting chairman in 1965-66 and Chair of Graduate Studies from the early 1980s until he retired Professor Emeritus in 1991.

Stone, Alma (April 26, 1921-November 5, 2013)

Alma Stone Williams attended the 1944 Summer Music Institute. She was the first African-American student to be enrolled at Black Mountain College and the first known black student to integrate a white college in the South. Prior to the 1944 summer, she attended Spelman College where she majored in English and music and graduated valedictorian. After receiving her M.A. degree in English from Atlanta University, she began her teaching career at the historic Penn School on St. Helena Island in South Carolina. Educator Horace Mann Bond recruited her to teach at Fort Valley State College and

recommended her to attend the 1944 summer. In 1945 she received a Julius Rosenwald Foundation Fellowship to attend the Juilliard School in New York. She received a second M.A. degree, this time in musicology, from the University of Maryland. At Fort Valley where she had returned to teach, she married a professor, Russell Williams, Sr. After his early death she taught at South Carolina State University, Savannah State University, and private music lessons to support their five children. She was co-founder of SONATA (Sponsors of New and Talented Artists) that provides funds for children of Savannah to study music with former members of the Savannah Symphony Orchestra and other recognized music professionals.

Stone, Frederick Mason (December 10, 1920-March 4, 1997)

Frederick "Fred" Stone was a student at Black Mountain College from 1939 through the fall of 1942. He was born in Waltham, Massachusetts. At the college, he studied theater, photography and writing as well as political theory. He played the role of Banquo in the college performance of *Macbeth*. He also took part in a project to study the Swannanoa Valley. He was a pilot in the Army Air Corps during World War II. A photographer and cinematographer during the 1950s, he founded Fred Stone Reprographics which he operated in Harvard Square in Cambridge, Massachusetts for many years. Stone married a Black Mountain student, Jane Robinson Stone and they had four children. After their divorce, he married Lucia Antonoli. He was active in community life, a member of the Cambridge Democratic City Committee and the Mid-Cambridge Neighborhood Association. He served on the Board of Directors of the Cambridge Mental Health Association.

Sunley, Robert (March 27, 1917 – January 3, 2008)

Robert "Bob" Sunley was a student at Black Mountain College from 1936 to 1939. He came to the college from Oberlin College. At Black Mountain Sunley took a general curriculum including literature, writing and music. He also took part in drama productions and other activities. He was elected Student Moderator and as such was a member of the Board of Fellows during the conflict that led to the resignation of John Andrew Rice, a college founder. When he left Black Mountain, Sunley moved to New York City where he took odd jobs. He also worked in Boston for Porter Sargent, father of a Black Mountain student and publisher of a prestigious guide to private schools. In Chicago he worked with his father who managed pension and profit-sharing plans and who published a series of independent newsletters on international events. He served in the army during World War II, primarily as an intelligence officer in an Arkansas camp. He also studied Japanese at the University of Michigan. After the war Sunley returned to New York where he worked as an editor at Prentice-Hall and then as coeditor of Critique, a short-lived monthly journal for art criticism and reviews. He and Leslie Katz, also a Black Mountain student, formed Touchstone Press, a small press which produced low-cost portfolios of art reproductions for museums and bookstores. Sunley obtained his B.A. degree at the New School of Social Research in New York and his M.A. in social work at Adelphi University. He worked in several psychiatric clinics in New York and Long Island as a therapist and chief social worker and also maintained a private practice in psychotherapy and psychoanalysis after further training. He was Associate Director at Family Service Association of Nassau County, where he designed and directed a number of innovative human service programs. He also taught at universities, was a consultant, and wrote articles, books, and papers on social services. He was author of Advocating Today: A Human Service Practioner's Handbook (1983); Serving the Unemployed and their Families (1986); and Righting Wrongs: Advocacy *Principles, Methods & Practice* 2008). For twenty years before his death, he was companion to Elizabeth Pollet, a Black Mountain student.

Suska, Adele (March 7, 1927-)

Adele Suska LaBreque was a student at Black Mountain College for the 1950-51 academic year and for the 1951 summer session. At the end of the summer she left for San Francisco with friends. She then returned to Black Mountain in the summer of 1952. Before arriving at Black Mountain, she had graduated in art from Hunter College in New York and studied at the Art Students League with Yashua Kunyoshi. At Black Mountain she studied design, color, textile design, dance and weaving. In New York she worked first as a creative director for a direct mail marketing company. She then worked in Saudi Arabia for Aramco, the Saudi Arabian oil and gas company, as a designer for their Middle East advertising. This involved designing in English text so that it could be translated into French and also into Arabic which would be written in calligraphy and read from right to left. During this period she travelled extensively in the Middle East. After six years, she returned to the United States with her husband, a data processor. For a year they travelled and she studied at Cordon Bleu. After five years in California they moved to North Africa where her husband worked for petroleum companies for about eighteen years. There was little opportunity there for work for a woman and so she painted and was a homemaker. When they returned to the United States, they lived in Clemmons, North Carolina. After the death of her husband, she move to Santa Fe where she is active as a volunteer at the Santa Fe Opera House.

Swierstra, Piet

Piet Swierstra came to the United States in 1946 from Leeuwarden in the Netherlands to visit her siblings who already had emigrated. In the Netherlands she had been a close friend of Trude Guermonprez (Elsesser), and in the fall of 1948, Guermonprez encouraged her to come to Black Mountain College as dietician. Swierstra was dietician from the fall of 1948 through the summer of 1949. She also took classes including dance with Elizabeth "Betty" Jennerjahn and music with Charlotte "Bimbus" Schlensinger. She helped Guermonprez set up looms and maintain the weaving room. In the summer of 1949, she provided Buckminster Fuller with ample coffee and was the only person willing to spend a night on a platform suspended from the dome.

When Swierstra left Black Mountain, she worked as dietician at Pond Farm in Guerneville, California, where Guermonprez was teaching. She then took care of the Dreier family including young Eddie and Barbara Beate in Schenectady, New York, when Barbara Dreier was recovering from hip surgery which required several months' recuperation in a full body cast. On her return to Leeuwarden, she married a cousin who worked in the agricultural industry. She was homemaker for the family including her son and daughter. She was active in the AWCC (Association for Women and Children Concerns (?)) and community organizations in the Netherlands.

Tavroges, Marie (June 2, 1930-)

Marie Tavroges Stillkind was a student at Black Mountain College in the spring of 1952. A native of Montreal, she had studied art at Sir George Williams College in Montreal, where she met Dorothea Rockburne, a Black Mountain student. She visited Rockburne at the college in the spring of 1951 and then returned to Montreal to earn money to enroll. She studied with Charles Olson, Wesley Huss, Hazel Larsen Archer and Katherine Litz. In June 1952 she travelled to England, the country of her birth. She visited the college in the summers of 1953 and 1954. On her return to the states from England, she lived in Montreal and New York where she held various jobs while writing a novel. In New York City she was an editor for the *Juilliard Review*. At that time she was introduced to Ray Johnson by Albert M. Fine, a composer. She was the first secretary of Ray Johnson's New York Correspondence School. Marie Stilkind worked as an editor. Her edited publications include *Best Loved Poems* (Merit Publications, 1980) and *Chicken Soup for the Soul* by Jack Canfield and Mark Victor Hansen (HCI, 1993).

Towery, Sarah Carlisle (October 4, 1911-August 16, 2007)

Sarah Carlisle Towery was a student at Black Mountain College during the 1944 Summer Art Institute. A painter and teacher, she conducted kindergarten and art classes in her home for fifty years. Treichler, William E. (July 24, 1924 -July 22, 2008)

William "Bill" Treichler was a student at Black Mountain College from 1947 to 1949 and a staff member responsible for grounds maintenance and other projects during the 1949 spring semester. He was born in Cedar Rapids, lowa, and moved with his parents in 1928 to a farm near Troy Mills, twenty-four miles

north of Cedar Rapids. On graduation from high school, he took a three-month, defense-training course in engineering at Iowa State College at Ames. Treichler entered the U.S. Army in September 1943, and in early 1945 was a B-17 bomber crewman stationed at Great Ashfield in East Anglia, UK. He returned home in November 1945, and took agronomy, forestry and animal husbandry courses at Iowa State College in the spring of 1946.

Treichler's mother first read about Black Mountain College and encouraged Treichler to apply. At the college Treichler took a general curriculum with an emphasis on science. He also took weaving with Trude Guermonprez. He met his future wife, Martha Rittenhouse, also from a farming family, at Black Mountain College and they were married in April 1950. For fifteen years the Treichlers practiced their ideas about organic farming and decentralized living in a three-generation family setting on his parents' farm in Iowa. Their five children—Rachel, Joe, George, Barbara and John—were born on the farm.

In the 1960s the Treichlers taught school and farmed in Colorado and Vermont. In the summer of 1975 they moved to a farm they had purchased in 1971 near Hammondsport, New York. Treichler restored their 1830s farmhouse and farmed their 87 acres. They raised much of their food and did their own construction. A registered dietician, Martha was a consultant dietician at area hospitals and nursing homes.

The Triechlers started *The Crooked Lake Review*, a local history magazine for the Finger Lakes and Lake Ontario region of New York.

Turner, Robert Chapman (July 22, 1913-July 26, 2005)

Robert Chapman Turner was an American potter known for his functional pottery, sculptural vessels and inspired teaching. Born in Port Washington, New York, Turner attended Swarthmore College and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1936. He then studied painting at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and earned a Master of Fine Arts degree from the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University in 1949. Between 1949 and 1951, Turner built a kiln at Black Mountain College and established a studio pottery program there. Later he returned to Alfred Station, where he was a studio potter. In 1958, he joined the Alfred University faculty, where he remained until his retirement as Professor Emeritus of Ceramic Art in 1979. He was a Fellow of the American Craft Council and recipient of its highest honor, the Gold Medal. He was also a member of the International Academy of Ceramics. Turner received numerous awards for his work, and participated in a number of group and solo exhibitions, both in the United States and abroad. His work is found in the permanent collections of museums in Japan and New Zealand, as well as The Smithsonian, The Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Philadelphia Museum of Art and numerous other private and public collections. A monograph *Robert Turner – Shaping Silence, A Live in Clay* with essays by Tony Hepburn and Marsha Miro (2003) documents his work.

Urbain, John (May 23, 1920 – April 8, 2009)

John Julian Arthur Urbain was born in Brussels, Belgium in 1920. He moved with his parents to Detroit in 1922. Urbain, one of a number of students from Cass Technical High School in Detroit to enroll at Black Mountain for the 1946 winter quarter on the suggestion of his friend and fellow student, Ray Johnson. He remained through the 1947 fall semester. Drafted into the U.S. Army in 1941, Urbain was an infantry corporal whose skill as an illustrator led him to create army training graphics and murals. Urbain's most influential teacher was artist Josef Albers, who opened his eyes to new approaches to design, color, matière and collage that soon became the dominant perspective from which Urbain would create art throughout his life. John married fellow artist and Black Mountain College student, Elaine Schmitt in 1946. In 1950 the couple moved to Paris, France where John studied art at the Académie de la Grande Chaumière and the Académie Julien. Urbain worked as art director for Philip Morris for more than twenty-five years, where he was instrumental in acquiring an outstanding corporate art collection. Although Urbain is known for his collages, he made prints and worked with sumi ink. His work is in the collections of the Museum of Modern Art, the Brooklyn Museum of Art, the National Gallery of Art, the Detroit, Houston and North Carolina Museum of Art, the Asheville Art Museum, and in numerous private collections and galleries in the US and abroad.

Voigt, Lou Bernard (June 18, 1915 – March 4, 1953)

Lou Bernard "Barney" Voigt was Instructor in Landscape Architecture and Botany from September 1942-September 1943. He received his Master of Architecture degree from Harvard. He first visited the college for a month in June 1942. He returned to the college in August to make a study of the landscaping and farming issues at the college. On August 30 he gave a talk on "Land Use Drawings." At Black Mountain College he worked with Lawrence Kocher and Josef Albers on a permanent landscaping plan. He also taught courses in botany, plant physiology, plant ecology and landscape architecture. When he left Black Mountain, Voigt worked with the firm of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill on site planning development for atomic plant installations at Oak Ridge, Tennessee and did work for the Office of Strategic Services and the Department of State in Washington, D.C. From 1948-50, while employed by the Planning Division of the National Capital Parks, he did design for parks, squares and circles in the Washington area. After 1950, he was engaged as a consultant by Charles M. Goodman Associates in Washington, D.C. His designs for Hollin Hills, a residential subdivision in Alexandria, Virginia, have been cited for the organic relationship between the houses and the existing landscape.

Wacker, Jeanne (August 14, 1922-)

Jeanne Wacker Sobran was a student at Black Mountain College for the academic years 1942-43 and 1943-44 and for the 1943 summer session. She enrolled at Black Mountain College on the advice of Jane Slater (Marquis) after two years at Brigham Young University in Salt Lake City, Utah. At Black Mountain she was closely allied with Eric Bentley, and in the summer of 1944 hitchhiked with another student to visit him at Fiske University in Tennessee. They were arrested on their return trip to the college, an event which was the catalyst for a major conflict which culminated in the resignations of a large group of faculty and students. Wacker married Joseph Sobran, conservative editor for *The National Review*. She wrote articles and reviews for the *Review*.

Watt, Jay (August 7, 1929-August 21, 2005)

Jay Watt's mother met John Stix, a former Black Mountain student at a party at Yale University where Stix was a student, and Stix suggested Black Mountain might be a good school for Jay. He enrolled for the academic years 1948-49, 1949-50, and 1951-52. He attended the 1951 and 1952 summer sessions. Watt was primarily interested in music, and he studied with Charlotte Schlesinger and Lou Harrison. At the college he composed music for several drama productions as well as *Flabbergasted*, a musical. He also participated in the Light Sound Movement Workshop given by Pete and Betty Jennerjahn. After he left Black Mountain, Watt composed for different projects including music for Stan VanDerBeek films.

Weitzer, Harry (September 10, 1926-)

Harry Weitzer attended Black Mountain College from 1945 to 1948. He grew up in St. Louis, Missouri and after high school graduation enrolled at Washington University. There he resented the rigidity of the curriculum. When he heard about the college from Black Mountain students in St. Louis, he applied. At the college he took a general curriculum including art with Ilya Bolotowsky and Josef Albers, woodworking with Mary Gregory as well as music, philosophy, psychology, history, surveying, economics and chemistry. He left with John Wallen and other students to form an experimental commune in Estacada, Oregon. His business, Design Group Incorporated, made library furniture and work stations. When he retired, he designed custom furniture.

Williamson, Margaret (June 29, 1924-)

Margaret Williamson Peterson was a student at Black Mountain College in the summer of 1945. At the time she was a third-year pre-med student at McGill University in Canada. She had previously taken art lessons at the Montreal Art Gallery with Goodridge Roberts and Arthur Lismer, the latter one of Canada's "Group of Seven" painters. Williamson's summer at BMC convinced her to withdraw from medical school and major in art. In 1946-47 she attended the Art Centre School in Los Angeles where Black Mountain teacher Alvin Lustig was teaching. She then moved to New York where she obtained a job with Franklin Watts, Inc. publishers who were starting a series of books for children. Williamson wrote and illustrated *My First Book of Bugs, My First Book of Birds,* and *My First Book of Mammals,* among others. After her teenaged son suffered a brain injury in an accident, she devoted herself to his care and became a family portrait photographer.

Willimetz, Emil Joseph (August 2, 1918 - July 2, 2003)

Emil Willimetz, the son of Austrian immigrants, grew up in the Bronx, New York. In high school he helped organize an anti-war strike and won a literary contest. Unable to afford college, he hitchhiked and rode the rails throughout the South. He arrived in Black Mountain during the summer of 1936 when only Theodore Dreier and his family were at the college. Dreier gave Willimetz a job building a fence, and a year later in the fall of 1937 he was admitted with a scholarship. He remained through the 1940 summer. At Black Mountain Willimetz took a general curriculum with a focus on writing and literature. He also took part in several plays and set up his own printing press. Willimetz and David Way operated the press as a commercial venture at Lake Eden in the summer of 1940. In the fall of 1940 Willimetz attended a training camp for CIO labor leaders at the Highlander Folk School in Tennessee. In April 1943 he was drafted and sent to the European front. Twice wounded, he was discharged and returned to the United States in March 1946. In New York Willimetz worked for Ezra Stoller, an architectural photographer, whose brother Claude Stoller had been a Black Mountain student. He then returned to Highlander Folk School to organize the Film Center there. In 1955 Willimetz formed PhotoGrafix, a commercial audio-visual company in Knoxville, Tennessee. In 1957 he moved to Peru where he formed his own film company, Audio Visual Productions S.A. He produced films for the U.S. Information Service for television, local universities, industry and other clients. In the 1970s Willimetz moved to New York and resumed his film production career. He also organized and led nature/adventure tours in the rainforest of the Amazon, South America, New Guinea and New Zealand. Willimetz was married to Joanna "Joie" Willimetz, a Bank Street graduate and teacher. They had two sons. Willimetz's autobiography Gringos was published in October 2003.

Woldin, Edwin Judd (May 30, 1925 – November 27, 2011)

Judd Woldin grew up in Somerville, New Jersey, where his father worked in the family shoe store. In the fall of 1944, he enrolled at Black Mountain College to study with the composer Heinrich Jalowetz. He completed that year at the college and enrolled for the 1945-46 fall and winter quarters. After the death of Jalowetz, he left for the spring quarter, returning for the 1946 summer work camp. He later earned B.A. degree in 1958 and his M.A. degree in 1960 from Rutgers University before beginning doctoral studies at Columbia. His musical career included traveling as a pianist with the Ink Spots, Don Elliott and Lionel Hampton, and playing in the pit of the Broadway musical *Hello, Dolly*. In the early 1970s he wrote the score for the Broadway musical *Raisin*, which was nominated for nine Tony Awards and won two, including best musical. He wrote a number of other musicals including Lorenzo, based on the Mozart librettist Lorenzo Da Ponte (with Richard Engquist); *Little Ham* (also with Engquist); *Jonah*; and *The Prince and the Pauper* (with Marc Elliott). For many years he was jazz pianist at the Windows of the World restaurant at the top of the World Trade Center.

Wright, Helen (October 29, 1919-)

Helen Wright Marden was a student at Black Mountain College from the fall of 1941 through the fall of 1944. She attended the 1943 summer work camp and the 1944 summer sessions. She had previously attended The Cambridge School in Massachusetts and Bennett Junior College in New York where she majored in art and had plans to become an art teacher. At Black Mountain she took art from Josef Albers and music from Edward Lowinsky as well as a general curriculum. She married fellow student Robert H. Marden in June 1944. While her husband was serving in the military, she worked in the office at Black Mountain College. She later was a homemaker for Marden and their two sons until she and Marden divorced.
